Marion Coppin's Body Found.

The body of Marion Coppin, who it will be remembered disappeared in a rather mysterious manner from Marshfield about the first of this month, was found floating in the bay near Bay City mill by Thomas Buckman and Wm. Blackman. Coroner Mingus held an autopsy but no signs of foul play were to be found.

While talking with J. C. Watson a few days ago as to what he had made out of his herd this season he stated that he had done better this season than any year since he had been dairying on the Coquille. He said that he had milked ten cows and from the first of May to the first of January, this year, the O. K. creamery had paid him on an average of \$8.50 per cow per month, or \$65.00 for eight months for each cow, and this he thought was pretty good for common cows. He stated that if he could do that well out of scrub stock he was going to see what he could do out of good, thoroughbred cows and has bought five head of the best Jersey stock he could get. This, we think, is a move in the right direction.
