Weather for 1905.

Annual Summary report for the year 1905. Station, Marshfield, Coos county, Oregon.

THE WEATHER BY MONTHS.

January: The mean temperature was 46.7; the highest 65 and the lowest 25. The total precipitation was 7.4 inches.

February: The mean temperature was 47.4; the highest 69 and the lowest 25. The total precipitation was 4.12 inches.

March: The mean temperature was 52.5; the highest 86 and the lowest 33. The total precipitation was 10.17 inches.

April: The mean temperature was 52.9; the highest 79 and the lowest 31. The total precipitation was 1.88 inches.

May: The mean temperature was 54; the highest 75 and the lowest 35. The total precipitation was 2.86 inches.

June: The mean temperature was 57.5; the highest 72 and the lowest 42. The total precipitation was 1.26 inches.

July: The mean temperature was 66.4; the highest 98 and the lowest 42. The total precipitation was .09 inch.

August: The mean temperature was 66.6; the highest 79 and the lowest 41. The total precipitation was zero.

September: The mean temperature was 60.2; the highest 80 and the lowest 40. The total precipitation was 1.48.

October: The mean temperature was 53.2; the highest 78 and the lowest 33. The total precipitation was 5.91 inches.

November: The mean temperature was 46.2; the highest 75 and the lowest 28. The total precipitation was 6 inches.

December: The mean temperature was 43.5; the highest 56 and the lowest 27. The total precipitation was 7.94 inches.

The total precipitation for the year was 49.18 inches; the greatest in 24 hours was 2.23 inches.

The highest temperature was 98 and the lowest 25. Number of days above 75 degrees 14. Number of days below 30 degrees, 18. The mean maximum temperature was 62.7. Mean minimum 43.4. Mean temperature 53.

The last frost of the spring occurred on the 26th of April but it was very light and did little damage to growing vegetation. The first light frost of the fall occurred on October 9th.

Number of clear days 133; partly cloudy, 35; cloudy, 197.

Passing off of Former Resident

DIED.—At his home in Napa, California, December 9, 1905, Calvin C. Barklow, of asthma and Bright's disease, aged sixty years, six months and eight days. Mr. Barklow was born in Lucas county, Ohio, in 1845, being one of a family of six children, of whom only three survive him. He moved with his parents, at the age of nine, to Missouri, where he lived till 23, at which time he went to Iowa where he met and married Miss Annie Hipson. To this union have been born five children, four sons and one daughter. Two of the boys fell asleep in death in childhood, and the daughter in young womanhood. In 1880 they moved to Oregon where they lived till 1892, when they moved to Napa, which has since been their home. Brother Barklow was converted and united with the Napa A. C. church under Rev. MacFadyen's ministry, and remained a member till the time of his death, although sickness made it impossible during late years for him to attend church much. He was also a member of the G. A. R. of Coquille City, Oregon, having served two years in the Missouri infantry, from which he received an honorable discharge. Four years ago he met with an accident from which he never fully recovered, and from that day till his death he was a constant and at times a great sufferer; but through it all he was never heard to complain, but patient-

ly submitted, and death found him ready and still submissive. Brother Barklow was a firm believer in the soon coming of Christ, and died in that blessed hope of seeing Him, and being made like Him. A loving wife, two sons, two brothers and one sister, with a host of friends are left to mourn. Words of comfort were spoken by the writer from 2nd Sam. 14:14, assisted by Elder V. F. Hunt, pastor of the Napa A. C. church.

Water Opals in Wallowa County.

Among other attendants at the Press Association last week was F. G. Conley, of the Wallowa News, who carried about with him as an exhibit of what his county produced a collection of water opals, "as pure as rain-drops, tinted with the reflection of a fading rainbow," and he did a great deal to create interest in his home town by exhibiting them among the newspaper men. Speaking of his treasurers to a reporter, he said:

"One might say with very little fear of contradiction that Wallowa county produces every mineral under the sun. These opals I picked up along the banks of the Wallowa river last summer. They are of fine quality, but by no means rare. In the same neighborhood is also found the finest rock crystal in the world for optical purposes. The crystals, which are hard enough to cut glass like a diamond, are hexagonal, and are found between strata of lime rock and lead ore lying along side of a dyke of iron ore in what geologists term the "upset" formation of Wallowa county. Side by side with the quartz crystals are found masses of galena, crystalline lead ore, of various sizes.

"A few months ago an expert from Chicago visited Wallowa and took back with him a piece of the rock crystal about five inches long and several inches thick. Since then a letter has been received from him stating that part of the crystal has been cut up into lenses, and that the pieces will net an incredibly large sum when finally disposed of in that form.—Mining Journal.
