The Evening Telegram, of Portland, of the 22nd inst., contains a long article concerning the finding of a complete counterfeiter's outfit in a room of Hotel Portland, occupied by a woman who registered as Mrs. Bertha E. Gordon, of North Bend, wife of Sam Gordon, the Coos Bay contractor. She had been arrested on a telegram from San Francisco for passing a bogus note in that city, and the above-mentioned articles were found in her room later. The U. S. secret service authorities were notified, and no doubt but she will be called up to answer on both charges.
