Obituary.

Samuel S. McAdams was born in the state of Illinois, April 23, 1823, and died at his home near Coquille City, Oregon, February 20th, 1906, aged 82 years, 9 months and 23 days.

Mr. McAdams came from Illinois to California, crossing the plains with ox teams in the year 1849.

He was married to Catherine A. Bickmore in 1866. To this union was born thirteen children, ten of whom are living, seven sons and three daughters. They remained in California until 1875, then moved to Oregon and resided here until death came and took him into the world beyond. He leaves a wife and ten children. May the dear

Lord bless and comfort the bereaved family and bring them to that heavenly home where sorrow, pain and death are not known.

The funeral services were held in the M. E. church, South, February 22nd, conducted by Rev. H. M. Branham.

As Mr. McAdams was one of the pioneer settlers of Oregon, and well known, many friends and acquaintances attended the funeral. His body was laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery to await the final resurrection.
