

A Golden Wedding.

Tuesday afternoon of last week the home of our old and esteemed townspeople, Mr. and Mrs. John Kronenberg, was the scene of a rare occasion as well as a social event long to be remembered by a host of their friends and a number of their family. This was the occasion of the celebration of their fiftieth wedding anniversary which was carried out in a fitting and appropriate manner. Two p. m. was the time set for the receiving of friends, and from that hour till late in the afternoon their home was the scene of a throng of friends who came bearing golden presents appropriate to the occasion, and words of congratulation and good cheer to the happy couple—we may say happily—truthfully and sincerely, as there are few couples, young or old, more happy than they. The guests were received by their daughter-in-law, Mrs. F. W. Kronenberg, and after congratulations, were ushered into the dining room where dainty refreshments were served.

John Kronenberg was born in Germany, Jan. 23, 1826, and came to America 70 years ago, and to the Pacific coast the first time in March, 1849, when he engaged in mining in California with good success, returning later to his old home at Baltimore, where he had known Mrs. Kronenberg since childhood. He returned to California again, the first time coming around Cape Horn, the latter by way of the Isthmus of Panama. Mrs. Kronenberg (nee Miss Katherine E. Bigler) was born at Baltimore, Md., 69 years ago and came to the coast in 1856, and their engagement which was made during his trip back home was fulfilled at San Francisco, March 6, 1856. They moved to Coos county in 1859, since when they have been identified with Coos in all her ups and downs, and have done their part in subduing the forest, and bringing about the great changes in this country since their arrival here, and having made the acquaintance of most of those who have lived here long, and have fast friends in all.

Nurses Save Patients.

Women nurses at the county poor farm rescued 40 ailing and infirm patients who were confined in the upper story of one of the old frame structures which caught fire shortly before noon today from a spark, supposed to have fallen from a chimney on an adjoining building. Dinner was being served at the poor farm when the alarm was sounded. Under the regime of Superintendent Jackson a fire department has been organized and drilled at the farm, and the sharp, quick ringing of the dinner bell is given as an alarm of fire.

Instantly there was wild commotion. The wind was blowing a gale and when attendants of the place rushed out, the roof of the west wing was wrapped in flames.

In the upper story of the west wing there were some 40 patients. Nurses at once turned themselves into rescuers and rushed into the building to aid the unfortunates. They carried the ailing ones down the stairs, succeeding in removing all of them without injury.—Portland Journal.

Eighteen Hundred Miners Entombed.

Paris, March 10.—A terrible catastrophe has occurred at a coal mine in the Courriers district of the Pash de Calais, 18 miles from Bethune. An explosion of gas killed many miners, and three chambers of the mine are on fire. The number of victims is not known, but 1800 miners descended into the pit this morning.

The explosion occurred at 7 o'clock this morning. The first news which reached the Ministry of Public Works announced that it was impossible to calculate even approximately the number of victims, but it was hoped that most of the miners had sought refuge in the lateral galleries.
