Some Prominent Visitors

Coos Bay was visited this week by a party of wealthy capitalists from the outside and their presence here may be fraught with great importance to this section.

In the party were David Eccles, Marshall J. Kinney and Paul G. Bates. The latter is an insurance man of Portland and a friend of Mr. Eccles.

Mr. Kinney is well known here having three years ago invested ninety thousand dollars in an option on the Southern Oregon company's holdings. Mr. Kinney now makes his headquarters in Portland. He is a most enthusiastic believer in Coos Bay and predicts for us a great city.

Mr. Kinney visited the Bay some weeks ago and while reticent in regard to his mission it is understood that he secured options on certain properties. It is believed that these options are still pending and that the parties have them under consideration.

David Eccles is a multi-millionaire of Salt Lake City. His visit here is of great significance from the fact that he is president of the Utah Construction company which is practically building the Western Pacific railroad. Mr. Eccles' contract is for about 700 miles of the road, Salt Lake City to Oroville, California, and is a ten-million dollar job.

Mr. Eccles is largely interested in other enterprises, and beside being worth four or five millions himself, it is said he commands many millions more.

Mr. Eccles is also president of the First National Bank of Ogden, president of the Amalgamated Sugar Company of Utah, president of the Sumpter Valley Railroad Company, president of the Mount Hood Railroad Company, and president of the Oregon Lumber Company which has mills at Baber City, Hood River and Inglis on the Columbia.

The conjecture was that Mr. Eccles was here looking over our timber resources, possibly in the interest of the Western Pacific railroad. If this surmise should prove correct it would mean that the Coquille intend to build a branch to Coos Bay. Members of the party declined to be interviewed in regard to any business in hand. Mr. Eccles spoke glowingly of this country. He was delighted with what he saw and said that in any event his visit would result in much good for us. Mr. Eccles' favorable impression will result in attracting the attention of many people to Coos Bay. The party came in on the Kilburn last Saturday and left Wednesday morning on the Drain stage.—Coos Bay Harbor.

Democratic Mass Meeting.

Pursuant to a call of the chairman of the county central committee a mass meeting of the Democratic party of Coos county was held at the courthouse in Coquille, March 15th. A committee of six was appointed to draft resolutions declaring the principles of the party. The committee reported with resolutions recommending adherence to the general principles of democracy which have governed the party in the past, and those set forth by the Democrats of the state in mass meeting assembled at Portland on the 7th inst, and also recommending an economical administration of affairs of our county, and a more general distribution of road funds on the different roads of the county, which were adopted. The Farmers' Institute for Coos county met at North Bend last Friday, the 17th, and completed their organization by adopting a constitution and by laws. There was a good attendance and Prof. W. C. Hawley, of Willamette University, being at North Bend, was asked to address the meeting which he did in a very able and interesting manner. L. J. Simpson was elected permanent chairman, E. R. Peterson secretary, R. C. Dement of Myrtle Point vice president and Orvil Dodge treasurer. The next meeting will be held in this city April 17, 1906. All persons who wish to join at that time can do so by signing the constitution and paying a fee of fifty cents. The object of the institute is to enable farmers, and any one interested, to meet and discuss problems that would be of interest to farmers, giving experience in experiments and thus educate each other and endeavor to better conditions.
