Ira Tucker, of the Flanagan & Bennett dairy farm on the lower river, passed through town from a trip to the Bay, on Thursday.

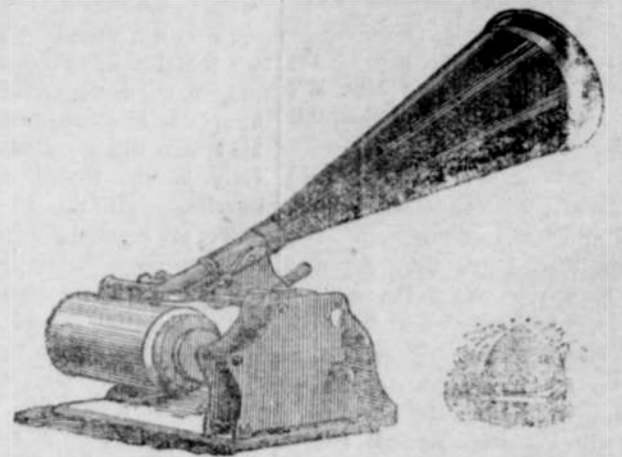
