Inter-Collegiate Must Go.

San Francisco, March 23.—The first inroad by the Rugby football game into the arena of American university athletics has been accomplished in California, partly as a result of the prevalent dissatisfaction at the roughness of the inter-collegiate game and partly in consequence of the splendid exhibition of the Rugby game given here recently by New Zealand and British Columbia games.

At a meeting of the committee on the part of the University of California and Stanford University a resolution was passed substituting the Rugby game for the inter-collegiate game as heretofore played. There is considerable dissatisfaction among the students of the two universities at the action of the committee, but nothing can be done. They must either play Rugby or give up football.

Chicago, March 23.—At a meeting of trustees of the Northwestern University last night it was decided to abolish inter-collegiate football at the university for five years. It was agreed to engage one member of the faculty to have charge of all athletics. The debts of the athletic association, amounting to \$12,000, will be assumed by the university.

Convicts Build Roads.

Governor Chamberlain has authorized Superintendent James, of the state prison, to put a crew of men at work at the quarry. Twenty-seven men are working today, and are busy in drilling and blasting rock. The county furnishes two foremen to direct the work, and the convicts are watched by two armed guards. Only men with a good prison record and adapted to that particular work have been picked out to do the work.

The men are taken to their work on the street cars each morning, and returned in the evening. They are fed at the quarry at the noon hour at the county's expense. A large canvas has been stretched over the rock crusher and the part of the quarry where the men are employed, so that the work may be done effectively, notwithstanding the rain. It is thought that by beginning the preparation of the rock early, it will be ready to be placed on the roads at a more convenient and seasonable time than a year ago. The experiment of employing convict labor will be one that will be watched with some common interest.—Coquille Journal.
