The many friends of Mrs. P. S. Robinson will be pleased to learn that she is improving nicely now, and will soon be around again.

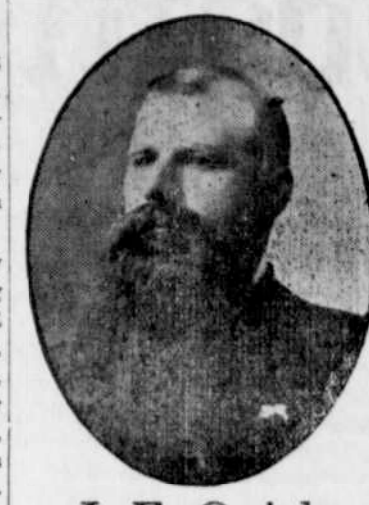
Mrs. Eugene Schetter and children, of Marshfield, and her sister and daughter from San Francisco are visiting their uncle, Capt. O. Reed.
