

Prohibition Wins in Nine Counties.

"We regard the victory scored by the anti-liquor forces at Monday's election as one of the most important ever won in the United States."

"The counties that have gone for prohibition are Linn, Lane, Yamhill, Tillamook, Willamette, Benton, Sherman, Gilliam and Lincoln, as well as parts of Columbia and Coos. In the former county the election will close about 11 o'clock, and in the latter fully a dozen. These, added together in the counties in which the election went in our favor, as a whole, make a grand total of about 220.

"Two breweries are affected, one at Albany and another at Astoria. Under the law these institutions may continue to manufacture beer, but they will not be allowed to sell or distribute it in the precincts that have gone dry.

"In Astoria the precincts, 6, 7 and 8, went for prohibition of liquor sales. These include the districts in which the Swedes and Finns reside. There is a significant fact connected with the vote there. It has always been contended that the foreign element is the worst foe of temperance and prohibition, but the election in the three Astoria precincts refutes this. From the Swedes and Finns were received the most encouragement during the campaign at that place, and the best vote Monday. They maintained temperance organizations, and carried on a big demonstration in the nature of a parade last Saturday.

"Monday's vote goes to show how public sentiment is growing on the saloon question. The local option law was adopted by only 2000 votes, while the proposed amendment, which would have killed it utterly, was defeated by 9000. In this county two years ago the local option law defeated by 1600, while at Monday's election the amendment was defeated by 1700.

The people resent the constant efforts of the saloons to control politics and evade the laws, and the vote shows it. The saloon is its own worst enemy by always seeking to overthrow the law and override decent regulation. Whenever this policy is abandoned and the saloon comes within the pale of decency, and is run as other business institutions are run with due regard to law and order, the agitation against it will cease; otherwise they will never relax until the evil is run out of the state."

Obituary.

E. H. Beyers died June 6, 1906, at his home in Sumner, Oregon, of heart failure.

Mr. Beyers had been ailing for some time, but during the last three weeks he had a more severe attack which terminated in his death. He was born in Stark county, Ohio, May 9, 1841, and died June 6, 1906, age 65 years and 28 days.

In 1862 he was married to Barbara Ellen Weaver in Canton, Ohio. In the fall of the same year they with others left their native state for the far West, traveling as far as the state of Iowa, where they wintered. In the spring of 1863, with a company of emigrants consisting of 36 wagons they crossed the plains to California, being three months on the way. After reaching California Mr. and Mrs. Beyers left the company at Larsen county where they resided until 1870. They then resided until 1870. They then removed to Elks county, Nevada, where they resided until in 1883, when they left Nevada, and came to Oregon and settled in Sumner, Coos county, on the place where they now reside. To them were born nine children; three in California, four in Nevada and two in Coos county, Oregon. One son died in California and one in Sumner, Oregon. Seven children and seven grandchildren, with the widow, are left to mourn the loss of husband, father and grandfather. There were present of the children to follow the remains to the last resting place, Mrs. Frank Black, Mr. J. P. Beyers, Misses Millie and Nettie Beyers. The others could not be

A Big Land Deal.

Our friend, C. F. Allen, of San Francisco, who has for a number of years been interested in black sand mining machinery, but who of late has interested himself in timber lands, consummated a deal lately for an eastern company covering 46 timber claims, paying therefor \$67,523. The claims are on Eucher creek, Curry county, and cover a fine body of valuable timber, which means the erection some day of an immense saw mill and probably wooden ware factories which will mean a great deal to the residents of our sister county. Oregon's timber is attracting a great deal of attention these days and the time is not far distant when it will be in great demand, and its manufacture and shipment will bring great quantities of cash into south-western Oregon.

Anton Wirth Drowned.

On Thursday of last week Anton Wirth, of Coos river, was at Marshfield and left town in a small boat for his home, and later the boat was found without any occupant and it is supposed that Mr. Wirth is drowned. The river has been dragged but to no purpose. He leaves a wife, two sons and a daughter to mourn his sad and untimely taking off.

E. B. Burns, the Rogue river canneryman and one of the parties assisting in an attempt to take some machinery up the rapids of that stream in a boat, lost their lives by drowning on the 6th inst. They ascended the rapids in a light boat with a line which they made and was paying out when Mr. Burns became entangled in the line and was pulled overboard. In the attempt of the other parties to save Mr. Burns the boat was swamped with the above result.
