Help for San Francisco Schools

Salem, Oregon, May 28, 1906. To School Officers and Teachers of the Public Schools of Oregon: Ladies and Gentlemen:

As a result of the great catastrophe which befell San Francisco on the 18th of April, 1906, thirty-four buildings were destroyed, to replace which will cost about \$6,000,000 and a consequent lack of employment for the teachers who taught therein, the school authorities of San Francisco are led to accept proffered donations to be devoted exclusively to a Reconstruction Fund for the rebuilding of their schools. They do not desire to seem to beg, but the finances of the City of San Francisco will be strained to the utmost and it would be a considerable time before they unaided, could hope to replace their schools. It is their purpose, whenever the contributions from a given state shall reach a sufficient amount to construct a building, to name that building after the state giving the money. In any event, tablets showing the source from which the building fund came will be placed upon the buildings and it will doubtless be a matter of pride for the rising generation in their visits to the new and more glorious San Francisco to visit the building which stands as a monument to their generosity and sympathy.

In view of these facts, I would respectfully suggest that your respective school devise ways and means by which contributions, either great or small, may be made to this very worthy cause.

Making Money From Bees

The business of bee-keeping, according to a writer in the New Idea Woman's Magazine for July, is "light, fascinating and pleasant." In fact, as the bees do the work, it seems that this occupation is the nearest that there is to having a number of good investments with certain dividends. "The initial outlay," says this writer "may be very small; fifteen dollars will secure a modern hive, a colony of good Italian bees, with a queen, and all of the necessary accessories. As soon as a little experience has been gained, the apiary may be built up by adding nuclei (a few hundred working bees) together with new queens at intervals at the cost of a few dollars. The natural increase will then result in an apiary of fifty or one hundred colonies in a few years."

Many good suggestions are given to those desiring to add to their income by this charming industry. It appears that the time to begin the business of bee-keeping is during the summer months, and "there will be little to do except to watch the bees at their work and become as familiar as possible with their habits." One duty of the keeper, however is to protect the bees as far as possible from their insect enemies "brush away the spider's web, craftily woven near the hive entrance as well as to drive off the bold ant who is constantly robbing the beehive of her honey." Particularly for women, who desire to earn a modest income for themselves in the country, is bee-keeping recommended as an "ideal outdoor occupation."
