Portland, June 19.—Mrs. Emma L. Watson, companion of S. A. D. Pater, under conviction for complicity in land frauds, this morning surrendered to the Federal authorities and was lodged in the county jail to await sentence.

Whenever the Oregon Agricultural College can get around to it there is a subject of great importance awaiting it and that is co-operation among farmers. This is a subject which is of great interest to farmers at all times and it is one that the educated man generally avoids because he knows it is a very difficult question and one that has never been studied as thoroughly as its importance deserves. Visionaries who anticipate impossible results and schemers who deliberately mislead the people are constantly creating a distrust of co-operative methods, and yet both in the United States and in other countries there have been enough cases of notable success to show that co-operative methods may be made of great benefit to farmers. A thorough study of the history of co-operative organizations by persons who are wholly free from prejudice either for or against such organizations is much needed.—Rural Northwest.

The appropriation asked for the purchase of the Barlow road failed by a negative majority of 18,000 votes in the late election. The owners, seeing the futility of the attempt to foist this road upon the state at a price many times its value, even to the few to whom it is of any use at all, will probably close with a reasonably offer from the farmers along the route, or, finding tolls few, will throw it open to such travel as seeks that unfrequented route across the mountains. In any event, it is a matter in which the general public now has very little interest.—Oregonian.

The midsummer meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural Society is to be held at Salem, July 6 and 7. Cups to the aggregate value of \$100 are to be given as premiums for displays of cherries. The meeting will be in the main devoted to the cherry industry, but the walnut will also receive special attention. This meeting should attract a very large attendance.—Oregon Agriculturist.

Drain Normal School.

The Board of Regents for the Central Oregon State Normal School at Drain elected the following teachers at their meeting June 16, 1906: A. L. Briggs, President; O. C. Brown, Vice President and Principal Training School; H. L. Dale, Science; Miss Harriet Warfield, History and German; Miss Alice Bretherton, Latin and English; Miss Bertha L. Kay, Reading and English; Miss Nina Johnson, Vocal Music; Critic Teachers, Miss Daisy Hoover, Miss Alta Spalding, Mrs. O. C. Brown. One critic teacher and teacher of instrumental music is yet to be elected.

It was decided by the Board of Regents to build a new building for the Training School, to supply a good working library, a physical and chemical laboratory, install a first-class steam heat, and make a general repair of the building.

The teacher's review class has been a decided success as 35 persons took the teachers' county examination and all passed. There is a greater demand for trained teachers than we can supply.

The enrollment for the year just closed was double that of last year, and the graduating class was three times as great. The prospects for another year are very bright and a large class will graduate.

Two free scholarships are offered every school district to be awarded to the pupils standing highest in the eighth grade county examinations during 1906, also one to each high school to be awarded to the student passing the highest examination.

School will open Tuesday September 25th.
