East Norway Notes.

A notice has been posted by the county superintendent for a meeting of the voters of Dist. No 43 to change the boundary line.

Post Office Inspector Vickery is investigating an eastern seed firm which has victimized several people in Coos county.

The Sentinel deplores the loss of the saloon money for Coquille. Don't weep but get the voters to locate a county or district high school in your city and Coquille and vicinity will regain more than they have lost by going "dry."

At Arago Saturday night Superintendent Bunch emphasized the need of district high schools in Coos county and recommended the consolidation of three or four districts with boarding houses for those who lived at a distance and the teachers. He also took up the subject of complaints and said that parents should not try to run the school but the teacher should be open to reason and be of high moral character and above all have no favorites. Religion and politics should be kept out of school and the teacher should avoid personalities and neighborhood difficulties. He said all the scholars should be taught to depend upon themselves as too much assistance by the teacher deprived them of their abilities and a teacher should let no particular pupil know she was particularly interested in him. Country children were under environments but their work if not too onerous was of great value to them and they should have the same advantages for learning as the more idle town children. The Superintendent's advice was timely and we hope it will have results. The commencement exercises were attended by a large crowd from East and West Norway as the teacher, Minnie McCloskey who has taught in this district is very popular.

The Loggers Vocabulary.

The language of these woodsmen often more forcible than elegant, is as picturesque as their surroundings. Most of us know what a "sapling" is, but what is a "road monkey" or a "bull donkey"? A "road monkey" keeps a logging road in condition, a "bull donkey" is simply a big donkey engine. Yet these are some of the woodsmen's common terms. For instance, a "briar" is a crosscut saw, a "bully" is a foreman of a logging camp, a "choker" is a noose of wire rope. "Of course," you say. But what is a "goose pen"? Why, a big hole burned in the standing tree. Easy? Well, then, here's another. What is a "window-maker"? Answer, a loose, hanging, broken limb, which is supposed always to mean danger to the man who gets under it.

And so it goes. A "dead man," for instance, is a fallen tree, but a "dead head" is a sunken log. A "dozy" log is one that is decayed. A single sled is a "dray," but it likewise may also be a "bob" or a "croche," a "go devil," a "lizard," a "scoot," or a "sloop," but never a "sled." With fine insight into human nature the woodsman knows the sub-foreman of the "head-push," Mr. Pinchot's Forest Service, has compiled a "logger's dictionary," which contains all these and many more words just as picturesque.—The Reader for July.
