A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, there was submitted to the electors of the State at the last general election as required by law an initiative petition for,

"A law to provide additional revenue for state purposes and to levy a license on the gross earnings of certain companies and corporations, to-wit: express companies or corporations, telephone companies or corporations doing business in this state; defining the manner of ascertaining the amount of such gross earnings, providing a penalty for violating the provisions of the act, defining an express company, a telephone company and a telegraph company within the meaning of the act;" and

Whereas, on the 25th day of June, 1906, the Secretary of State in my presence as Governor of the State of Oregon did canvass the votes given for and against said law, and

Whereas, it was ascertained and determined upon such canvass that there were 70,872 votes cast for said proposed law, and 6,360 votes against the same, and that said proposed law received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law,

Now, therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, as Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the State of Oregon at said election for and against said proposed law was as hereinbefore stated, and that said proposed law received an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law, and that said law hereinbefore mentioned shall be and is in full force and effect as of the date of this proclamation.

Done at the Capitol at Salem this 25th day of June A. D. 1906.

Veterans in Reunion.

Three Big Days Here Next August 29-30-31.

Messrs. D. A. Huling, R. W. Lundy and W. H. Renfro, representing Col. Jewel Post No. 53, G. A. R. as the committee to arrange program and dates for the reunion of the Southwestern Oregon Veterans' Association have selected, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, August 29, 30, and 31 as the dates for that event and are preparing to entertain visiting veterans and their families in royal style. Handsome souvenirs for the occasion have been ordered and other preliminary work is under full headway to give three big days to the visitors. A camp will be established at the Dixon grove, off of Spruce street where exercise will be given during one of the days of the reunion. Plans are being made to care for many visitors and a program worthy of their notice will be offered. The reunion is not only for veterans of the civil war, but any man who has served in Uncle Sam's army is eligible to membership in the association so that Spanish American war veterans and veterans of the Indian and other wars will be included and can take part in the program while people, generally, whether members of the association or not will be invited to attend.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

Anton Wirth's Body Found.

Last Sunday morning the news announced the body of the late Anton Wirth, who lost his life supposedly while intoxicated some four weeks ago by falling overboard in trying to make a landing.

T. F. Hauschildt of Coos River was passing a point opposite the Al Smith place in a boat last Sunday morning about 4 a. m. and discovered the body lying high and dry upon the mud bank, with his face buried in the earth. Mr. Hauschildt immediately notified the authorities of Marshfield of his gruesome discovery, and the body was brought to the city. The remains were in a very decomposed condition but identification was established by a letter found in his pocket that had been written to him by Captain C. E. Edwards of the steamer Alert, and also by his clothing.

Justice of the Peace C. L. Pennock held the inquest over the body in the J. A. Lewis undertaking parlors Sunday morning, the jury returning a verdict of accidental drowning.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday afternoon at the Wirth ranch in Melioma, Wm. Luse of Coos River officiating. A number of the relatives and neighbors were present. Interment took place on the old homestead.

Mr. Wirth, it will be remembered disappeared mysteriously some four weeks ago, his empty boat being found drifting around in a boom near the Coos Bay Creamery the following morning. It was at once reported that he must have fallen overboard while trying to make a landing, in an intoxicated state.

Mr. Wirth had been a resident of Coos Bay for many years past and was known as one of the most scientific and experienced horticulturists of this section of the state. He is survived by a wife, two sons, W. A. Wirth and Lewis Wirth and one daughter Mrs. Wm. Eickworth.—Coos Bay Times.
