A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, there was submitted to the electors of the State at the last general election as required by law an initiative petition for,

"A law to provide additional revenue for state purposes and to levy a license on the gross earnings of certain companies and corporations, to-wit: express companies or corporations, telephone companies or corporations doing business in this state; defining the manner of ascertaining the amount of such gross earnings, providing a penalty for violating the provisions of the act, defining an express company, a telephone company and a telegraph company within the meaning of the act;" and

Whereas, on the 25th day of June, 1906, the Secretary of State in my presence as Governor of the State of Oregon did canvas the votes given for and against said law, and

Whereas, it was ascertained and determined upon such canvass that there were 70,872 votes cast for said proposed law, and 6,360 votes against the same, and that said proposed law received an affirmative majority of the total number of effective votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law,

Now, therefore, I, George E. Chamberlain, as Governor of the State of Oregon, in obedience to and by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby make and issue this proclamation to the people of the State of Oregon, and do announce and declare that the whole number of votes cast in the State of Oregon at said election for and against said proposed law was as hereinbefore stated, and that said proposed law received an affirmative majority of the total number of votes cast thereon and entitled to be counted under the provisions of law, and that said law hereinbefore mentioned shall be and is in full force and effect as the law of the State of Oregon from the date of this proclamation.

Done at the Capitol at Salem this 25th day of June A. D. 1906.

Another Million Transferred For Klamath Project

Washington, July 14.—The Secretary of the Interior has transferred another \$1,000,000 to the reclamation fund for the Klamath irrigation project, making \$2,000,000 now immediately available for construction. The greater part of this will be spent in Oregon, a small portion of the irrigation land being in California. Work is being energetically pushed on the construction of the outlet tunnel from Klamath Lake.

The Secretary also pledges \$2,400,000 to complete the project. This additional money is to be available as soon as needed. This increase is the result of Senator Fulton's work during the last session.

Other additions were made as follows:

Hondo, N. M., from \$240,000 to \$336,000.

Minidoka, Idaho, \$1,300,000 to \$1,550,000.

Truckee, Carson, Nev., from \$3,450,000 to \$3,700,000.

Payette, Boise, Idaho, from \$1,800,000 to \$1,490,000.

Lower Yellowstone, Mont., from \$1,900,000, \$2,700,000.

The increases were made because of the advance in the price of labor and building material.
