## Hundreds Burned and Buried.

New York, 17.—An earthquake so severe as to largely wreck the city, was experienced at Valparaiso, Chile, some time last evening, according to messages giving the barest of details, which came though last night from that point.

Following the shocks, which are reported to have been more severe than those in San Francisco, fires from overturned stoves and furnaces broke out in several parts of the city, and a great conflagration, similar to that which wiped out the California city, is supposed to be in progress. One message says portions of the great port were burning all night, and hundreds of lives were lost, the victims having been caught in collapsed and burning buildings.

Santiago De Chile, Aug. 16—(Delayed.)—The worst earthquake ever remembered occurred this evening at about eight o'clock. Houses fell in the streets, which were filled with hysterical people. The clerks at the Cabinet offices say that the telegraph lines to the coast are severed. The electric lights are out, and as the correspondent is trying to file this dispatch the earthquake is again starting. He can hear the people wailing and praying in the streets while the fire bells throughout the city are ringing out alarms.
