ENCAMPMENT AND REUNION.

War Veterans and Pioneers Meet Together.

The annual encampment of the soldiers of the Southwestern Oregon Veterans' Association and the reunion of the Coos County Pioneers' Association held at Myrtle Point this year, closed on Friday evening after three days real and wholesome enjoyment. The enterprising citizens of the town had left nothing undone which would add to the comfort or pleasure of its visitors, and the city itself was dressed in its Sunday best. Spruce street, the principal thoroughfare through the city was decorated with evergreens, flags and bunting in a manner that would have done credit to a city, while the grove was seated, and also decorated with flags and bunting and a new platform constructed and in all ways put in perfect order.

The reception committee accompanied by a file and drum corps and Company Q of the guard house squad, met all trains and extended a hearty welcome to all arriving guests and escorted them to the grounds.

The exercises at the grove were of a pleasing and entertaining nature all the way through, beginning Wednesday evening when Mayor Leep formally turned the keys of the city (excepting those of the chicken houses) over to the visitors, and, we might say here that he might as well included them, as it was discovered by some enterprising vet that a cork-screw would do the business, but the results of the discovery must not be explained.

Colonel R. H. Ross, of Bandon, responded to the Mayor's welcome on behalf of the veterans, accepting the courtesies extended and gave full assurance of a hearty appreciation of the same, and referred to the fact that this was not the first reunion they had enjoyed in Myrtle Point.

Held for Collier Murderer.

Moscow, Idaho, Aug. 30.—Judge Lukes today decided to hold W. J. Shriver and Roy Taylor to the next grand jury for the murder of David Collier, and fixed their bonds at \$600 each. The preliminary examination of the accused occupied all of the last week and at the conclusion of the arguments of counsel Saturday evening the court took the case under advisement. The bonds fixed are the lowest ever known in Idaho where the crime charged manslaughter.

Collier, a young man, who came here from Coquille, Or., and it is alleged he was set upon by Shriver and Taylor about 1 o'clock on the morning of July 31 and beaten and kicked, the injuries resulting therefrom causing his death the same day. All the parties to the fracas were under the influence of liquor at the time.
