Chicago, Nov. 12.—More than half the passengers on an immigrant train on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad were killed or injured in a collision today between the passenger train and a freight near Woodville, Ind. One hundred and sixty-five passengers were on the train, and of these 47 were either killed outright or burned to death in the fire which broke out in the wreckage immediately after the collision. The names of all the dead will probably never be known, as 45 of the bodies were consumed in the flames, or were so badly burned that identification is impossible. Thirty-eight people were injured, and several of these will die. Eighty others escaped unhurt, but lost nearly all their baggage and clothing.

The disaster was caused by a blunder of some employee of the railroad company, but just where the blame lies has not been determined.

The building was necessitated by the increased patronage in this line by the dairymen and it is to be ready for operating of next season's product.
