Good Fire Insurance

To those interested in good fire insurance, the insuring public and to Continental Agents, Gentlemen: I take pleasure in handing you herewith copy of a statement called for by and filed with the Superintendent of Insurance for State of New York, showing the condition of the Continental as of November 1, 1906, and giving information regarding its San Francisco conflagration losses.

Second—Does not patronize weak concerns for reinsurance;

Fourth—Having sold fire insurance, pay its losses without quibbling and without reference to what other companies are doing.

Fifth—Is operating under the Safety Fund Law of New York State.

More than seventy-five hundred men are commissioned to act as Agents for the Continental in the




