Appropriation Recommendation.

"An estimate of the appropriation for the next fiscal year submitted to congress today by the secretary of the treasury includes \$111,200 for the Salem Indian school; \$12,000 for the Klamath, Warm Springs, Walla Walla, Cayuse and Umatilla tribes, and \$6,000 for incidental expenses of Oregon Indians. "For improving Oregon rivers and harbors: Tillamook bay and bar, \$10,000; Coquille river, \$40,000; Coos Bay, maintenance, \$3,000, for improving Columbia and Snake rivers, \$10,000; the Cascades of the Columbia, \$105,000; Willamette and Yamhill rivers above Portland, \$60,000; lower Willamette and Columbia, \$450,000. "Improvements mouth of the Columbia at Three Mile rapids, \$750,000.

"For Washington rivers and harbors, estimates are made aggregating \$91,000

"For Oregon lighthouses, estimates are: Cape Blanco, \$5,000; Cape Arago, \$20,000; Yaquina Head, \$4,000.

"Eliza Island, Wash., \$30,000; improvement of Carter Lake Park, \$7,300."—Portland Journal.

A Reply.

EDITOR HERALD: In your issue of the 21st ult., I find an article headed, "Did it Ever Occur to You, Mr. Farmer?" Now, Mr. Editor, you seem to be quick to print such an article for the merchants; I hope you will be equally as quick to publish a reply. Now, Mr. Priggins, I am a farmer, or producer, as I think you should have said, and am proud of it, too. Mr. Priggins, did you ever stop to think how many farmers there is in Coos county who are living off of the farmers? We think you should not be quite so rough on us at the start. Please let us down easy. Now, Mr. Priggins, I want to tell you that the farmer is not going to ask you, or Mr. Merchant either, where he shall spend his money, for he is going to try to spend it where he can do the best with it, let it be in Coquille or in Chicago. You say that the stream of mail order house trade may be the means of bankrupting the merchants of Coquille. Though it should, which would be the worst to have a few bankrupt merchants or a whole county full of bankrupt farmers?

Give the farmer a market for his products and you will get his money back, but if he is obliged to seek a market for what he has to sell and he is apt to seek elsewhere to find a good place to make his purchases, but what about that market you said the merchants make for us? If we raise a few spuds to spare, or anything else far that matter, we have to wait for a Coos Bay or San Francisco potato man to come and buy them. You merchants here can't handle them, so they say. Neither will they touch our hay. Now, let us reason together a little. I think we can fix it to compel the farmers to trade with our local merchants. You see the merchants buy their goods from traveling salesmen. They are an unnecessary middle man who produces nothing. Let our merchants buy their goods to the same wholesale house that we do, and get his goods in large quantities, he will get goods at a reduced price, and also get reduced freight rates on large amounts. Then let him sell at reasonable profits and what will be the consequences? The result is plainly to be seen. The farmers will simply trade with the local merchants.

Now, Mr. Priggins, I don't see how the farmers can advance the price of real estate by trading with our local merchants. We have a way of our own to advance real estate that suits us much better, that is by clearing off the forest, digging out the stumps and fencing and improving the land. You say that the merchant is our neighbor—let us see. If one of our merchants came to my house on business near meal time I would try to be neighborly by as much as asking him to dine with us, or stop over night. Does the merchant do that with us? I don't think so.

Now, Mr. Priggins, I am willing to stop our foolishness by asking of you that when you write again give us something to designate what you are; a merchant, an editor, a lawyer or a d-g-f. Yours,

Town Washed Away

Phoenix, Arizona, Dec. 4.—It is reported tonight that fifty people have been drowned in the floods at Clifton, Arizona. Attempts to confirm the report have been futile, as the wires are all down.

It is also reported that the Gila Valley, Globe and Northern railroad bridge over the Gila river at San Carlos is gone. Salt river has destroyed three bents of the Phoenix and Eastern bridge.

Phoenix, Arizona, Dec. 4.—A message received here tonight from Tucson says the town of Clifton is half destroyed. A report that between 50 and 60 lives were lost is partially confirmed.
