Improvements Positively Promised.

Good news comes from Washington. Yesterday L. J. Simpson, mayor of North Bend, received telegrams which are highly gratifying. They give the assurance that Mr. Burton has promised a new survey of the harbor with a view of a new project, and that he favors dredging.

This is what is wanted. The survey for a new project is what has been wished for, and if such an order goes through congress the people on the bay will be satisfied. The dredging is still another proposition that goes with the improvement of the harbor, and this seems to be forthcoming. The telegrams which give this news are contained in messages from Senator Fulton and Peter Loggie, and were received by Mr. Simpson. They are as follows: Washington, D. C. Dec. 9, '06. To L. J. Simpson, North Bend, Ore.

Had hearing today before house, rivers and harbors committee. Both Loggie and Dodge were present and each made strong statement for Coos Bay and Coquille, Chairman Burton positively promised provision in river and harbor bill for survey and estimate for new project at entrance to Coos Bay, and also spoke strongly in favor of dredge for coast harbors and improving Coquille river and continuing improvements under present project to completion. Proposed Steamship Line Falls Through

The steamship line proposed between Portland and Alaska has failed to materialize, owing to lack of support—moral and otherwise—sufficient to enable the establishment of such a line. The promoters probably realized the disadvantages under which they labored from the beginning. Seattle's established trade and prestige was not to be overlooked by those who were invited to invest. A direct steamship line to Nome alone could not be expected to be profitable and investors always look for profits in the form of dividends. The advantage of the Southern Alaska trade to Seattle is not to be denied. Were the profits as large and sure as had been pointed out they would and must be, it is safe to assume private capital would ere this have taken the plum from the tree. Far better that the enterprise died in embryo than that another publicity failure should have been incurred owing to the eager assumption of doubtful dorofits.

The Puget Sound boosters cannot be presumed to sit quietly while Oregon capital makes an attempt to wrest from their grasp the trade, so long now their own. The gauntlet once thrown down, the contest may safely be considered a long-drawn-out and expensive fight. Would it pay to make the effort, while Oregon's own Alaska still remains practically undiscovered?

Rich in minerals, agricultural prospects, dairy possibilities and to be opened soon to railroad development, with unlimited possibilities for the promotion of improved and profitable waterways, Oregon's Alaska lies practically dormant in the Willamette Valley, Eastern and Central Oregon, Klamath and Coos Bay countries. Little need Portland fear from the possible and, for all that, practical upbuilding of another large city and harbor in the Coos Bay country. Oregon, with its great resources, has only Portland boasting of dailies of national repute. The Beaver State needs development sufficient to warrant the establishment of several cities, approaching if not equalling in population and other matters the fair Rose City. When capital no longer can get sure and large returns from interior development, it may be willing to answer the call for an Alaskan steamship line. Until then Held's Tourist Bulletin stands unreservedly for the development of Oregon's resources with Oregon capital. Do it now.—Held's Tourist Bulletin.

From all accounts President Roosevelt is highly gratified with the manner in which his message has been received by congress and by the people generally. Naturally some criticism of different measures was to be expected and perhaps the storm of protest over the recommendations in the Japanese matter was a little stronger than was anticipated but all in all, the President wears the "do-lighted" Smile and tells his friends and callers that he is pleased. Before long he will have submitted to him the editorial comment on the message made in papers from all parts of the country. Much of this is even now piled high on the desk of Secretary Loeb whose task it will probably be to sort out the most important.

The special message on Panama will not be ready for Congress until the 17th of the month and with it the President has decided to send a number of photographs illustrating the progress that has been made on the canal. These pictures were taken by an expert photographer and are now in the hands of the canal commission. It will be the first time that a presidential message has ever gone to Congress accompanied by photographs.

An important feature of this message will be that portion bearing upon the scale of wages to be paid for trained and experienced men on the isthmus. This subject has been discussed with several officials who have visited Panama and now, it is said labor leaders in all sections are to be consulted in order that a satisfactory and permanent scale can be adopted, one which will end all complaints as to the inadequacy of wages.
