## Twenty Men Die in Mine

Trinidad, Colo., Jan. 23.—Twenty miners, according to information available this evening, lost their lives as the result of an explosion which occurred at 3 o'clock this morning in the Colorado Fuel and Iron company's mine near Primero, twenty miles west of this city. Twenty coffins have been ordered by the company from allocat undertaking establishment. With one exception, all the men Italians. District Superintendent O'Neill is personally directing the work of rescue, and volunteers from adjacent mines assisting. The work will be kept up night and day until the entire mine is explored. During the entire day excitement ran high, and relatives of the entombed men stood waiting at the entrance for a sight of the victims that might be brought to the surface. An attempt is being made to force air into the mine, in the hope that some of the entombed men may be alive. The damage cannot be estimated tonight, but latest advices are that the mine is badly wrecked.
