The Chicago wheat market ad-  
 vanced more than a cent a bushel  
 yesterday, not on the edict of the  
 American Society of Equity, but be-  
 cause bad weather in the winter  
 wheat districts and reported damage  
 to the Argentine and Russian crops  
 stiffened up the foreign market.  
 There is more wheat in the United  
 States than is needed for home con-  
 sumption, and the course of the mar-  
 ket of this country will depend,  
 from now until a new crop is grown,  
 on the conditions in foreign coun-  
 tries. Some aid to the strength  
 will, of course, be supplied by any  
 damage to the growing crop in this  
 country, but the foreign situation  
 will control prices. Just at present  
 Pacific Coast wheat growers are re-  
 ceiving slightly better prices than  
 European values by reason of an un-  
 precedented demand from the Ori-  
 ent. The permanency of this de-  
 mand is by no means assured.—Ore-  
 gonian.
