And she was right. We desire to say however, that the old oval style was far superior to the modern vertical style in every way, and particularly in speed, beauty and legibility. In fact the modern vertical style had not a single redeeming feature about it, not one. It has not a single good point to recommend it. Beyond all question of debate it is an absolute unmitigated curse to the public schools of this country. No boy or girl who learns it can obtain a good business position, with up to date men or firms, and use this vertical system. This is a
