Coos Bay News
The bill to annex the Loon Lake section of Douglas county failed. The road from Allegany, on North Coos river, will be built to Loon Lake, nevertheless, even if Douglas still refuses to assist. Coos bay offers a market for the products of that section, and the settlers are determined that the road shall be opened.

A young man named Bert Snodgrass was drowned in the Chetco river lately by the upsetting of a skiff. Five other occupants, including two ladies, managed to catch the brush along the banks and dragged themselves ashore.

The old Arcata is running between Humboldt and San Francisco, carrying lumber and shingles. We notice by the papers that Capt. Reed is again in command of the ancient craft.

It was rumored in town last week that the S. P. intend to make a shipping point at the mouth of North slough, below Glasgow, and that lumber from the valley counties will be hauled there for shipment. Owing to the passage of the Chapin bill by the legislature, which provides for demurrage in case cars are not provided to shippers when demanded, the S. P. will be obliged to purchase a great many more cars, or have a shorter haul for the cars now in use. A shipping point on Coos bay would solve the problem.

The schooner Alpha, which went ashore on the sand beach between the Umpqua and Siuslaw on Feb. 3rd, will be wrecked, after which the hull will probably be burned to secure the iron, etc., used in its construction. A number of vessels have gone ashore at various times along this section of the Oregon coast, and with the exception of the iron bark Baroda, which was beached below Bandon, none of them were ever floated. The beach is shelving, with a long line of breakers to contend with, and it is generally regarded as a hopeless task to attempt to float a vessel that has been beaten up to the seawall on the ocean beach.

Capt. E. W. Robblee, of the brig Harriet G., which arrived in the bay Saturday afternoon, reports that on Feb. 18, latitude 39.25 north; longitude 126 west, he spoke the schooner Rita Newman, which was on that date 25 days out from Coquille river, with disabled machinery and short of provisions. Capt. Robblee says that for nearly three days after speaking the Newman he experienced fresh northwest winds, and that the disabled vessel should have made the city under sail with out any trouble.—A dispatch received by the Times, dated at San Francisco, Feb. 23 stated that the Newman had arrived in tow of the steam schooner Coaster.
