

H. M. Winter, consulting engineer and salesman from the Portland office of the General Electric Company made a special trip to Coquille last week and spent several days with Frank Morse, proprietor of the electric light plant. The future improvement and development of the entire system was thoroughly gone over by them and plans decided upon.

As a first step, an order was placed with the General Electric Company for a 150 kilowatt 3 phase generator, to be delivered not later than October 1. The machine weighs about 5 tons and will care for 5000 lights wired, and can also be used to furnish power. It is of the very latest improved design. Further improvements will be made as the business increases and demands them.

A new marble switch board with the most up to date equipment was put in this winter and a Tirrill automatic voltage regulator was ordered at the same time but has not arrived yet. This regulator will maintain a constant voltage thus permitting the use of the highest efficiency lamps and a new line of lamps will be introduced as soon as the supply can be obtained from the east.

The new lamp will give 20 candle power on a consumption of 50 watts at 110 volts, or 16 candle power at 106 volts. The lights will be furnished at the same price per month so that the consumer will get 25 per cent more light at the same price, with a saving in current of 13 per cent as the 16 candle power lamps at present in use take 56 watts, which will be decidedly an advantage to meter customers, and to the plant in the case of short rates. A line of "meridian" lamps will also be put on which gives 25 candle power with 50 watts and 50 candle power with 100 watts; but must be used with a special shade.

These improvements will put our electric service on a par with the best of them and in advance of any not similarly equipped, as the largest and most expensive plants use nothing better.

The Steamer Kilburn which arrived at the bay Saturday brought all the passengers she was allowed to carry, and was, we are told, obliged to leave about 200 in Portland for whom she had no room. There is an unprecedented influx of home-seekers arriving in Oregon at this time, and from present indications Coos county is going to get at least some of them, if not her full share. All persons who have properties to rent should at once put them in as inviting conditions as possible, as there is now a great demand for residences, and will doubtless be an increased demand in the near future. It is simply a shame to have strangers come in and find no place in which to shelter themselves, or, if they do find an empty house, it be in no fit condition for occupancy. There is no question but there is an excellent opening for profitable investment here in the way of constructing houses for renting purposes.

Talks of War With Japs.

Berlin, March 15.—Captain Ignace Rodio, of the general staff of the Austro-Hungarian army, published a pamphlet entitled, "The Prospects of the Future American-Japanese War." After discussing the armies and navies and theatres of war, he concludes by saying that the unprotected Pacific coast of the United States offers excellent chances for success of the Japanese. He declares Japan is working feverishly to complete her military and naval equipments, adding that during the last few months fifty thousand men were at work night and day in the arsenal turning out small arms, and stating that the cartridge manufacturing of Tokio, where in all twenty thousand men are employed, have turned out daily 500 rifles. Captain Rodio also asserts that the projectile works at Tokio make six hundred shells for the artillery.

Various other estimates are made, ranging from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

5. For such other and further relief as to the court shall seem meet and equitable.
