SUMMONS.

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF COOS:

A. E. Seaman, Plaintiff, vs. Henry Fletcher, Minnie Fletcher and John Doe, Defendants.

To Henry Fletcher, Minnie Fletcher and John Doe, the above-named defendants:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You and each of you, are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause, in which A. E. Seaman is plaintiff and you, the said Henry Fletcher, Minnie Fletcher and John Doe are defendants, within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: Within six weeks from the 13th day of March, 1907, and if you fail to so appear and answer on or before the 24th day of April, 1907, that date being the last day of the time prescribed in the order of publication, the said plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in the complaint in this suit, a succinct statement of which relief is as follows:

That the defendants and each of them, be required to set forth the nature of their claim in the real property in the complaint described, and that all adverse claims of the defendants or either of them, of any persons claiming under or through them to said real property be determined by a decree of the court herein.

That said decree be he held a final judgment and decreed that the defendants or either of them, have no estate, title or interest whatever in or to the real estate described as follows to-wit: "Lot one (1) in Block Three (3) in the town of South Marshfield, Coos County, state of Oregon, as surveyed and platted by A. J. McMillan C. E., for C. H. Merchant and Mary L.
