C. F. ALLEN KILLED. Shot by Night Watchman W. D. Clark at Bandon.

Last Wednesday morning, shortly after midnight, C. F. Allen, of San Francisco, the well-known black sand and platinum miner, and who had more recently been engaged in purchasing timber lands for an eastern firm, was shot and instantly killed by Night Watchman W. D. Clark at Bandon.

Mr. Allen and some other parties had come up the coast Tuesday, and he had engaged a room at the Tupper House, being conducted by the Gallier Brothers.

The day following Dr. Mingus, Coroner, was called and summoned a jury and conducted an investigation and inquest. The verdict of the jury was that the deceased came to his death by a gun shot wound inflicted by W. D. Clark in the performance of his duty as an officer.

In the Name of the State of Oregon; you are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: Within six weeks from the 6th day of March, 1907, the same being the date of the first publication of this summons.

And if you fail to appear and answer on or before the 17th day of April, 1907, the same being the last day of the time prescribed in the order of publication, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in his complaint, a succinct statement of which is as follows:
