There is a growing opinion in Coos county that the assessment of timber lands is entirely too low, and that a material increase of the figpres would swell the county's valuation and treasury receipts without beaping any injustice upon the speculative owner of timber. The opinion has found a decided birth, and there seem none to challenge it unless it be some who deal in timbered acreage either for speculation or manufacturing purposes. If it is the manufacturer he can not justly complain in a period when lumber and other products of the forest are soaring in the markets, and lumber has admittedly raised fifty per cent in the last three years. As for the speculator, the assessed value of his holdings is too small even if timber were half the commodity it is today. The farmer and other producer from the soil are usually assessed nearer their worth than any other taxpayer, and in all reason and fairness it is time other taxpayers were similarly treated, the land corporationists and gamblers in futures more especially. Assessor Thrift and his field force are now at work, and the HERALD is led to believe that they will show less leniency toward the timber interests of the county than last year, and be upheld besides by the Board of Equalization which follows.

The Sawmill Editor of the Coos

Bay Times should take a few months off for the purpose of informing himself on the lumbering conditions as they actually exist on the Pacific Coast. This suggestion is offered after reading his two-page effusion on the subject of C. A. Smith's projected mammoth mill in the vicinity of Marshfield. The writer of the article dwells upon the benefits -the greatly enlarged prosperity of Coos bay by the advent of the mill, which is all very proper, but in his exultant dissertation he makes use of the statement that only one other mill on the coast will have a greater cutting capacity per day. The plant of Mr. Smith will turn out 250,000 feet of lumber in ten hours' run, and in so doing it will have a class with the largest and best mills on the Pacific, though the claim must be disputed that there is none other of equal capacity at least between Puget Sound and the Gulf of Mexico.
