The petition circulated asking the County Commissioners to call an election throughout the county the first Monday in June to secure another expression on the liquor question was closed last Friday and formally filed with the County Clerk. The petition contains about 340 names, we are told, which is much more than the required ten per cent of the vote cast at the election last year, but the clerk is only permitted to count such names as appear on the last printed register. If this number totals ten per cent then it is probable the election will be called.
