## SUPERIOR COOS COUNTY.

Such is the Coquille Country With Its Excellent Resources and Increasing Industries.

The last few years have witnessed a wonderful growth in the prosperity of the Coquille country. On every hand we note evidences of the fact both in point of agriculture and manufacturing. Our tillable acreage is gradually enlarging as the lands are cleared or reclaimed, and there are more fields of grain, more gardens, more orchards, and increased dairy flocks everywhere noted. Farther down the stream we see new mills in the process of construction, and more that are contemplated. A second shipyard has been added to the industries of that locality, and a third is seriously considered. At each of the two existing yards there is a deal of activity, vessels being on the stocks and rushed toward completion as fast as men and means can facilitate that end.

That our section of Coos county should be passing through a period of such signal growth and prosperity is no cause for wonder to the student of our conditions and advantages. On this side of the Beaver Hill divide lies the greatest body of marketable timber and the greatest extent of soil that is capable of being tilled and cultivated. This fact combined with another, namely, that we have a navigable river whose bar offers the way to the markets of the world supplies reason for the attraction of homeseekers and capital to our midst. This waterway of Southern Coos was not so inviting to ocean commerce in its unimproved state, and this fact has retarded the development of the lower river particularly, but now that Congress has roused to the importance of the stream and made appropriation for its speedy betterment, we find those who contemplated investment in mills and factories going ahead with their plans. It required trouble and patience, not to say delay, to convince those in a position to help us that the Coquille River could be made a safe harbor for common sea-going craft, and after years of persistent effort success has rewarded us. True, we have not gotten as much appropriation as needed, but it is more than was sanguinely expected when Congress convened. With the \$60,000 obtained both the bar and inner stream at existing shoals can be deepened to an extent at least.

For a long time such exports of Southern Coos county as were shipped by way of Coos bay were counted in the export trade of that harbor, and the tendency was to detract in such measure from the claims of Coquille river for federal recognition. Last fall, however, there was a diligent inquiry into this matter by our Congressional representatives, and figures were prepared on the products that could have gone from this river with the conditions enabling. This course had a very material influence no doubt in securing the substantial appropriation made by Congress, as the figures showed rather formidable proportions when finally compiled and presented at Washington.

At the newly started shipyard of J. A. Price two miles north of Bandon there is a steam schooner under construction—half completed in fact—and another that is little more than started. The vessel so well along will have a length over all of 190 feet, and will ply between San Francisco and some northern point. The one for which the keel has been laid is intended for the San Francisco-Bandon run. A large force of men is employed at the yard, but it has been difficult to get sufficient of a skilled and experienced character, as ship carpenters are scarce with the large amount of shipbuilding under way along the coast.

E. Heuckendorff's yard at Prosper is another busy place. Here was launched a steamer but a few weeks ago, the model of which is the admiration of all sea-going men who see her. She will be towed to San Francisco laden with lumber, and there be fitted with her machinery. Another steam schooner was started on the stocks as soon as the one described was out of the way. Mr. Heuckendorff has turned out several vessels at his well-equipped plant, notable among which are the schooner Oregon and the fine steamer Raymond, all conspicuous among the smaller fleet of the Pacific coast.

Coquille river has furnished a loading point for many vessels heretofore, and the number is increasing and will continue to increase with the promised improvement of the stream. Their increase will be justified also by the added mills now constructing, whose output must reach the market through our river and necessitate more ships. The Herald has no fear to express for the permanent future of the Coquille country nor for the Coquille bar as a growing outlet for our products, and with the building of new mills and factories and the resumption of bar improvement work there is a season of exceptional activity promised us.

**Darkey Preacher Coming.**

There is an old colored preacher living in the western suburbs of Douglas county who is anxious to come to Coos and hold religious services, if we are to judge from letters he has written to people of this section of late. The aged darkey claims to have been a Baptist for a full half century and to have expounded the gospel on the southern plantations long before the war. One of his latest and most interesting letters reads as follows:

"I am powerfully anxious to come among you folks and spread the good Lord's word. But I'm very poor, and don't own no horse, and must foot it if I do come, though I'm seventy-nine years old last New Year. I don't mind walking anyhow if I've got a good pair boots, which I haven't got just now, as mine are pretty much worn in the heels and the soles. But the good book says go ye out and preach to all the world, and this I'm purposing to do. For forty years I've been roaming about, and worked and preached in nearly every State, but I've never yet seen Coos county, and there I'm going to go if the good Lord spares me a while longer. I want to visit Myrtle Point first, then Coquille, and Bandon, and the bay towns, and I feel it in my soul that I can do something for the sinners of them places. I'll be there as soon as the Lord and the roads and the weather will permit."

Josephus Jackson, for that is the name he signs, is evidently an eccentric old character, but sincere in his faith nevertheless. If he comes to Coquille he will certainly be cordially received.

### SUMMONS.

IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF COOS:

A. E. SEAMAN, Plaintiff,

Henry Fletcher, Minnie Fletcher and John Doe, Defendants.

To Henry Fletcher, Minnie Fletcher and John Doe, the above-named defendants:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You and each of you, are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause, in which A. E. Seaman is plaintiff and you, the above named Henry Fletcher, Minnie Fletcher and John Doe are defendants, within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: Within six weeks from the 18th day of March, 1907, and if you fail so to appear and answer on or before the 24th day of April, 1907, that said being the last day of the time prescribed in the order of publication, the said plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in the complaint in this suit, a succinct statement of which relief is as follows:

That the defendants and each of them, be required to set forth the nature of their claim in the real property in the complaint described, and that all adverse claims of the defendants or either of them, or any persons claiming under or through them to said real property be determined by a decree of the court hereon:

That by said decree it be declared, adjudged and decreed that the defendants or either of them, have no estate, title or interest whatever in or to the real estate described as follows to-wit: "Lot one (1) in Block Three (3) in the town of South Marshfield, Coos County, state of Oregon, as surveyed and platted by A.
