Attention Dairymen, Knowlton has a large stock of fodder corn, beet seed, carrot seed, and Vetches.

The hard rain of last Saturday and previous and subsequent raised the river to a height nearly as great as that of the last freshet, and considerable damage was the result. All the lower bottom lands were flooded, some to a considerable depth, and fences that were rebuilt after the last raise were swept away. Some ground had been plowed, but fortunately not a great deal. The greatest sufferers perhaps were the dairymen whose fields of fine grass were injured or destroyed, and who in some cases haven't hay to feed out. We have heard of no stock being drowned or other dire consequences as told by the Coos bay daily. The railroad was washed out in places between here and Myrtle Point and at Cedar Point, and no trains could run on Monday. Yesterday the train came as far as Coquille. The river, which rose about 10 feet at this point, receded very slowly because of there being much snow melting in the mountains. It was the first April freshet in many years and overwhelmed the farmers. Mails have been slow and irregular.
