Apple Growing Hereabout.

With conditions so favorable to apple growing in this section of Coos county there is wonder expressed by visitors from the horticultural belts that so little attention is paid to the calling by our otherwise industrious farmers. One ruralist with whom we conversed on the subject admitted the seeming indifference, but apologized by saying that dairying better paid, was better understood, and brought quicker and oftener returns. The explanation was very true, still it would seem there should be more and better looking orchards than we have. The farmer in question further stated that apples were once a larger product of our section but suffered reputation in the markets, not because of inferior quality but because of inferior packing and marketing. As a result the orchards for most part were neglected or abandoned and ranchers turned their attention to dairying. Fruit-growing is a remunerative pursuit where it can be carried on successfully and is intelligently handled. The packing of fruit is in itself a great feature of the business, and if this was neglected when orchards were an important thing of the valley, as represented, then it is natural there were hurtful consequences to too easily discourage the infant industry in our midst. The Herald takes pleasure in noting that a gentleman has come among us to engage exclusively in fruit raising, and will plant fifty acres to apples if suitable ground can be procured. This gentleman is satisfied we have a climate and soil adapted to the calling, and will risk his investment without delay. Gravenstines are the favorite apple of the Coquille valley. These he will raise with possibly other fruits, including peaches, as a side issue, and he is convinced of the wisdom of his undertaking, feeling that he has a very good market in Coos county alone for the product of his trees. No doubt the experiments of this gentleman, which are bound to prove successful, will be an incentive to other farmers of Southern Coos Co.

Mrs. Travis' Body to Eugene.

The remains of the late Mrs. Ella F. Travis, who died at Myrtle Point Monday morning of last week, were shipped to Marshfield by train, there to be transferred to steamer en route to Eugene via Portland. A son and daughter of decedent, L. M. Travis and Mrs. L. R. Edmundson, arrived at the Point from Eugene overlaid four days before the parent expired, and accompanied the body back to Eugene for the final obsequies. Besides the 2 children named there are three other children as follows: Prof. S. S. Travis of Columbia University, New York; Carl T. Travis, a law student in a university at Ann Arbor, and Miss Emma Travis, now studying at the University of Oregon.

Mrs. Travis came to this county as a canvasser, we believe, several weeks ago. She took cold shortly afterwards and pneumonia developed when she reached Myrtle Point, her sickness gradually growing worse until death relieved her among sympathizing strangers. The decedent was born in New York in 1846, and in 1866 became the wife of Rev. G. J. Travis who once was a Baptist minister at Marshfield, later at Eugene. He died 12 years ago.

The mysterious old man who died at North Bend after a very brief illness, and who was said to have gone there from Coquille, is recalled by different ones of this vicinity. It is claimed that he worked at odd jobs down the river and at Bandon, previously walking up the coast from the direction of Curry county and California. While in Coquille the poor old man, suffering and friendless, bought medicine before trudging toward the bay, and the bottle with its label was found on the body after death.

To Henry Fletcher, Minnie Fletcher and John Doe, the above-named defendants:
IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You and each of you, are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause, in which A. E. Seaman is plaintiff and you, the said Henry Fletcher, Minnie Fletcher and John Doe are defendants, within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: Within six weeks from the 13th day of March, 1907, and if you fail so to appear and answer on or before the 24th day of April, 1907, that date being the last day of the time prescribed in the order of publication, the said plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in the complaint in this suit, a succinct statement of which relief is as follows:
