## Frazier Tupper Dies at Portland.

B. F. Tupper of whom we have frequently made mention lately as being ill, and who was taken to Portland last week by his father, succumbed to the disease from which he suffered at an early hour Sunday morning.

The deceased was born in Nova Scotia, and would have been 45 years of age the 24th of next August. His parents came to the United States when he was six years of age, residing a few months in San Francisco, and then coming to Coos county which has been their home since.

He leaves a father, wife and four children to mourn his taking off. The children are Jessie, aged 20, Agnes 17, Lola 13 and Jack 8. He was a member of the Masonic order, the Odd Fellows, the Knights of Pythias and Redmen.

The funeral will take place at the Masonic cemetery in this city on the arrival of the steamer Alliance from Portland which is due at the bay tomorrow.

## Hermann Found not Guilty

Washington, D. C., April 27.—The jury in the case of Binger Hermann, former congressman and former commissioner of the general land office, returned a verdict of not guilty today. The jury was out all night. Hermann was charged with having destroyed public records while in the land office. The case was an exceedingly hard fought one, and has attracted attention throughout the country.

San Francisco, April 27.—"The acquittal of Congressman Hermann at Washington will have no effect on the prosecution of the land cases in which Hermann is involved in Oregon."—Statement by Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Francis J. Heney this afternoon.

## Attempt to Lynch Busch.

Pittsburg, Kan., April 25.—A mob of negroes made an unsuccessful attempt at Cornua, Kansas, to lynch Joseph Busch, arrested last week at Myrtle Point, Oregon, and charged with train robbery, when the train bearing Busch stopped at that station last night. Busch is believed to have been one of the men who robbed the passengers of a Missouri Pacific passenger train on the night of March 4, when John Henery, a negro who lives at Cornua, was killed. Busch was placed in jail here today.
