Coos Bay-Roseburg Electric Line

The principal topic of discussion for the past week or so in this county has been a move in which Roseburg people have taken the initiative by holding a mass meeting at which it was decided to do at least one thing, and that was, to find out how Coos county people felt in regard to the construction of an electric road from Roseburg to Coos bay, and by this time they have surely learned. Their first step was to send Hon. Louis that Barzee, a prominent attorney of city and secretary of their chamber of commerce, to see and talk with us which he did. Mass meetings were held in North Bend, Bandon, Myrtle Point, Coquille and Marshfield, at all of which our people took great interest and showed themselves to be in hearty accord with our Douglas county friends in this great move.

Now, that the local railroad from Marshfield to Myrtle Point has gone into the hands of the Southern Pacific, and it being the purpose of that company to make it a part of a strictly coast wise system, it begins to look almost imperative upon the part of Douglas and Coos to do something of this kind, and as the electric line is so admirably adapted to mountain transportation will there be no mistake made in putting in a line of this kind, if it is properly managed. There is sufficient water power along the line to generate the electricity with which to operate the line, thus reducing operating expenses to a minimum.

On Monday evening meetings were held in North Bend, Marshfield and Coquille, at each of which a committee was appointed to keep the good work going. E. M. Wait and Major Kinney, of Marshfield were present at the Coquille meeting which was largely attended and enthusiastic.

Myrtle Grove Creamery Burned

On Saturday morning at about 3 o'clock the Myrtle Grove creamery and cold storage plant was discovered to be in flames and before anything could be done the fire had so far advanced that there was no opportunity to do anything toward saving the building or any of its contents. The first warning of the existence of the fire was an explosion of the ammonia tank which shook the town and awoke a large number of the people. Mr. Whetstone was the nearest by and the first to see the building after the explosion, and he reports that the interior of the building, particularly at the west side, was filled with flames. The fact that there had not been any firing under the boiler later than the middle of the afternoon of the day before, and the fire having originated in the opposite side of the building, precludes the theory that it was due to any carelessness on the part of those who were conducting the creamery, and it is probably that the cause of the conflagration will never be known.

The loss will be divided between J. A. Davenport, J. W. Leneve and the lessee of the plant, J. N. Jacobson, the building and a great portion of the machinery being the property of the two former and a portion of the machinery and a big lot of butter, cream, etc., to the latter, and will amount to about \$10,000, with insurance to the amount of \$4500.

The origin of the fire will probably remain a mystery. This will prove a great loss to the community, not only as a creamery, but this was the principal source of our ice supply.

The Larsen shinglemill has been shut down for a few days installing new machinery, and the mill at this place has the new steam feed in place while M. O. Hooten and help are excavating for the big new boiler, and we also see great quantities of machinery going through town for the new mill near Bandon now in course of construction for Lyons & Johnson.

Judge Nosier Passes Away.

Judge John Huston Nosier, another of our early pioneers, who has been exceedingly feeble for a couple of years, and almost daily expected to pass away for the last two or three months, crossed over to the great beyond on Saturday night just before midnight. He was 76 years, one month and eighteen days of age at the time of his death. The funeral service was held at the Christian church on Monday at 2 p. m., and were attended by a large concourse of sorrowing friends and relatives, and the interment took place in the Odd Fellows' cemetery. The funeral sermon was preached by Elder H. L. Ford and was an able and impressive effort.

The deceased leaves a wife and four sons to mourn his demise, of whom all were present except the two younger sons, J. W. who is at Portland, and B. E., of Southern California.

In our next issue we will give an interesting sketch of this worthy pioneer whose career has thus closed.

A Rare Relic.

Our townsman, J. E. Perrott came into our office yesterday morning, bringing for our inspection a copy of the Daily Citizen, published at Vicksburg, Miss., and bearing date of July 2, 1863. The paper, which is printed on the blank side of a strip of wall paper, was procured by Mr. Perrott's father at the siege of Vicksburg, two days after the regular issue was out, and which was of a later issue and contained the following which are of interest:

Porter is enjoying a season of rest, and his men are doubtless obliged to him for his kind consideration for their welfare. On Tuesday he fired a few shells from his parrots, and kept his men tolerably busy sharpshooting across the river, with no other result than might be expected. The mortars have not been used for nearly forty-eight hours. Poor fool, he might as well give up the vain aspiration he entertains of capturing our city or exterminating our people, and return to his master and receive the reward such a gasconading dolt will meet at the hands of the unappreciating government at Washington.

JULY 4th, 1863. Two days brings about great changes. The banner of the Union floats over Vicksburg. Gen Grant has "caught the rabbit;" he has dined in Vicksburg, and he did bring his dinner with him. Jailed and Fined

Portland, Ore., May 3.—Former State Senator Franklin P. Mays and W. N. Jones were today sentenced by Federal Judge W. H. Hunt in connection with the land fraud cases of eastern Oregon. Mays' punishment is \$10,000 fine and four months imprisonment in the Multnomah county jail, and that of Jones is \$2,000 and eight months' imprisonment in the county jail.

Mays' sentence was stayed until November 1 in order to give him time to appeal. The sentences of Hamilton H. Hendricks and Coe D. Barnard, implicated in the same case, went over until September because of objections by the government to the manner in which the defendant's bill of exceptions was prepared.

The defendants in this case were convicted of attempting to defraud the government of an immense area of public land by illegally fencing it.
