One ditch 416 feet long, 36 feet wide on the bottom, at the river bank, being the outlet of said proposed drainage system. One ditch 2940 feet long, 24 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep.

One ditch 3564 feet long, 6 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep.

One ditch 5730 feet long, 20 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep.

One ditch 1968 feet long, 10 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep.

One ditch 7776 feet long, 24 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep.

One ditch 3696 feet long, 10 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep.

One ditch 3102 feet long, 6 feet wide and 3 1/2 feet deep.
