Custom receipts are breaking all previous records and have now reached the highest point in the history of the government. They are greater at the present time than for the whole of 1906, and those for the month of June are yet to be added to the grand total. The receipts for May have been nearly \$48,000,000, and if June customs prove to be as heavy as those of May, the total for the fiscal year will reach well toward \$350,000,000. The treasury officials hardly expect this as they say there is likely to be a falling off in June. The highest figure they are willing to set is \$300,000,000, but they admit this is conservative. The Secretary of the Treasury, customs officials and the officials of the treasury in general, are greatly pleased at the remarkable showing made by the custom returns this year. None so far has arisen to give a detailed explanation for the vast receipts, but in a broad way it is ascribed to the great prosperity of the country. The United States has money to spend to buy heavily abroad, and is spending it.
