## J. N. Fielder Killed.

J. N. Fielder, well known in Coquille and on the bay, was killed Saturday afternoon by being run over by a train at the junction. Mr. Fielder was section foreman and with his crew of men was looking after the track at that point when No. 2 came along. His men stepped to one side of the track and he to the other to allow the train to pass, but as it approached, Mr. Fielder seemed to be intently watching the track, it is supposed to see if the weight of the locomotive would cause it to show signs of weakness, and when it was but a few feet from him he attempted to cross the track, still watching toward the locomotive, when he stumbled in the middle of the track and before the train could be stopped the locomotive and three cars had passed over him. Both of his legs were cut off and he was bruised in the chest and died in a few minutes. The train had started up only a short distance back and had not gained a speed of more than ten or twelve miles an hour, but was so close upon him when he fell that there was no time to stop. The deceased was about 50 years of age and leaves a widow and three children living at Coaledo, and two daughters. By a former marriage. Mr. Fielder had lived here some four years and had been in the employment of the road about three years.

## Runaway in Parade

While turning the corner at sixth and Morison streets during the parade late this afternoon, the team attached to the floral float of the Lady Maccabees became frightened and started to run away. They dashed madly into the crowd, but before they had gone any distance, the frame of the float broke, and all on it were thrown to the ground, some of them being badly hurt. Among the injured were Margaret Cavanaugh, Mrs. Belding, Mrs. Clara Knott, Mrs. Wright, Mrs. W. I. Wilson and Albert Holman, a boy. All were riding on the float. C. H. Ayers, living at Montavilla, was run into by the team and his face badly cut. His right eye was almost knocked out. While several of the women only received flesh wounds, Miss Cavanaugh and Mrs. Wright are thought to have received internal injuries. There is a chance for the rich City of Portland to award a gold medal to one of its policemen. When he saw the team start on its short, wild run, he made a grab for the bridle of the first horse and clung to it until the animals were stopped and thrown to the ground.—Telegram.

## Grover Cleveland Ill

New York, June 19.—Advises from Princeton today state that ex-President Grover Cleveland has been seriously ill at his home there for some days, and that for some time his family and friends who knew of his condition were much alarmed. Mr. Cleveland, it is said, has now passed the crisis.

In an opinion handed down by Attorney-General Crawford, in answer to a query from Hon. John F. Hall, county judge of Coos county, asking whether the local option vote taken in West Coquille precinct in 1906 holds that precinct prohibition, notwithstanding another vote was had in 1907, and resulted in a vote against prohibition, and also the West Coquille precinct voted against prohibition. The opinion holds that the precinct is still dry, as was voted in 1906, as no vote can change that decision for a term of two years.—Capital Journal.

Denver, Colo., June 19.—Secretary Arthur Williams, of the Denver Chamber of Commerce, acting in the name of that organization, last night sent telegrams to President Roosevelt at Oyster Bay and President Clowry of the Western Union Telegraph Company, at New York, urging them to use every effort to prevent a strike growing out of the demands of the telegraphers.

New York, June 19.—The Summer rush for Europe is in full swing and every steamship leaving port for the other side is thronged with passengers. The big liner Adriatic, which sailed for Southampton today had on board 665 cabin passengers, every berth in the saloon and second cabin being taken.

## Good May Returns.

George Tucker, the South Coos River dairyman, called at our office today and exhibited his statement from the Coos Bay Condensing Co., which he received for the month of May. Mr. Tucker was then milking a string of 40 cows and sent to the condensary during that period 42,294 pounds of milk for which he received \$528.67 at the rate of \$1.25 per hundred. The maximum daily shipment for the month was 1485 pounds and the minimum 1196 pounds.—Sun.

## Boyce-Carlson Wedding.

On Tuesday evening of this week Clarence W. Boyce and Edith Carlson were united in marriage by the Rev. Geo. Roack, at the home of the groom's parents. The two contracting parties are well known in this city, having lived here the greater part of their lives, the groom being a well known "No. 1" life-saving laddie. The young couple will make their home in this city, and the Recorder extends many well wishes and congratulations.—Bandon Recorder.

The whale which was sighted off the Coquille bar last week has been washed ashore on Whiskey Run, about six miles above Bandon. Many of the Bandon people have been making tracks up the beach recently to examine the curiosity. The whale is estimated at being 50 feet long and nearly 10 feet wide, and is of the species known as the hump-back or deep sea whale, which is rarely seen near shore, and is usually found in southern waters.—Recorder.
