### Fairbanks Saves Drowning Woman.

Yellowstone Lake, Yellowstone Park, Wyo., July 8.—Vice President Fairbanks is a hero. His long legs and presence of mind stood him in good stead yesterday evening, when he plunged into a lake and rescued Miss Lena Wallace, a waitress at the hotel where he is staying. It so happened that she is the girl who has been attending his table which makes the incident all the more pleasing.

Mr. Fairbanks and J. E. Gibbs, proprietor of the hotel, were sitting on the piazza overlooking the lake exchanging stories when they saw a boat coming across the lake containing several persons. The Vice-President was laughing boisterously at some remark made by Gibbs when a piercing shriek alarmed both of them and they noticed that the boat had capsized. Two men and two women had managed to gain their footing and were making for the pier, but another woman was floundering in the water.

Mr. Fairbanks leaped over the railing of the piazza and ran to the pier. The woman had sunk twice and was going down for the third time when he reached her, half swimming and half wading, and seized her clothing. The water was over his head, but he managed to hold to the woman until one of the men on the pier realized the situation and swam out. He and Fairbanks brought in the woman, who was resuscitated at the hotel.

It required a half hour's work to restore her to consciousness, after which Mr. Fairbanks went to his room and changed his clothing.

### Seedless Tomatoes.

Success has crowned the efforts of the experts in the Agricultural department in the attempt to produce a seedless tomato. The work has been going on for six years at the experiment farm of the department and officials are immensely gratified at the results. The new tomato is only one of a number of interesting vegetables that have been produced by cross breeding. It has developed into a fixed type and crosses with other plants having little or no effect upon it.

The seedless tomato is not always seedless. Sometimes it has no seeds at all, sometimes it may contain fifty. The plant is a very large one, of excellent flavor and has been given the name of "Giant." It is the result of a cross of the Golden Sunrise on the Dwarf Champion. The plant is a persistent bearer and flowers up to the killing frosts in November.

Among other experiments in the same line is that of one of the experts who has succeeded in accomplishing the same results but by an entirely different process, the excessive use of fertilizers. Some of these tomatoes were dwarfed and some were large enough for table use, while others had the flavor of strawberries. All of the seedless plants, it is said, have to be propagated by cuttings.

### Want Pacific Naval Base.

Washington, July 10.—There is a rumor that Secretary Root is negotiating with Mexico for the purchase of Magdalena Bay, or if necessary all of Lower California, in order to secure another naval base. The Secretary's contemplated visit to Mexico seems to lend color to the story.

Inquire at the Mexican legation elicited the reply that Ambassador Crell was away for the summer and that no negotiations were under way at present. The only question known to be under consideration is regarding the building of a dam on Mexican soil to prevent the overflow of the Imperial valley lands. The dam was built, but the negotiations regarding it have never been completed.

The heads of the naval bureau assert ignorance of the plans of the administration to send the battleship fleet to the Pacific, notwithstanding official confirmation of the reports. These bureau chiefs say that they are engaged only in routine work and that they are making no unusual preparations. They also assert that they have had no orders to do otherwise. And on the surface there are few signs of abnormal activity in the Navy Department. Many of the chiefs are away and the unusual proportion of subordinates are on vacation.

He told Judge Kenesaw M. Landis of the United States District Court that which the Standard Oil's attorneys had previously declared was none of the court's business, and who had stated that the information would not be supplied.

The Standard Oil Company of Indiana is owned by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. Mr. Rockefeller said so.

And he told many other things that were interesting.

For instance, he acknowledged that the New Jersey corporation, capitalized at \$100,000,000 has at times declared annual dividends of 40 per cent.

Mr. Rockefeller slipped quickly out of Chicago tonight quite unobserved, after being here twenty-eight and a half hours. Except for the company of his valet, he left for Cleveland alone. His stay in town was cut short by the illness of Mrs. Rockefeller at the oil king's Forest hill estate.

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### Fortune For Inventor.

Uncle Sam is in need of a successful device to deliver mail bags from swift moving trains and he is willing to pay well for it. Many inventors for this purpose have been made but none of them have been satisfactory and the postal officials are becoming discouraged in their attempts to secure one.

At present a simple hook device has been adopted by which a passing train takes up a waiting mail bag. This is done by means of a hook and catcher.

The same scheme has been tried for delivering bags but has been found unsuccessful, the momentum gained in discharging the 22 pound bag being too great to be withstood by a device of this kind.

Hundreds of reports and complaints reach the Postoffice Department daily of mail sacks that are thrown on to the platform of the stations where it is impossible to make stops. The bags are frequently forced under the wheels by suction, are ground to pieces and the mail scattered broadcast. If they escape destruction in this way, they are badly torn and knocked about by ordinary rough handling. The government is anxious to spread the news as to its wants in a delivering device in the hope that some inventive genius will come to its assistance.
