The following item appeared in the Coos Bay News in May, 1874, and contrasted with the present, shows the progress we have made: Emboldened by the success of Capt. Rackliffe's schooner, the Corlelia, the owner of a little scow with a propeller in her, has commenced making trips between the Coquille river and San Francisco during the summer months. She is called the Twin Sisters and arrived at Pohl's mill in the fore part of last week. On her way up she stopped at the Rogue river fisheries and took on about forty barrels of salmon. She then loaded 53,000 feet of cedar lumber at Pohl's and sailed for San Francisco on Saturday afternoon. If this trade can be kept up so as to enable the farmers along the river to ship potatoes, bacon, etc., by these little vessels, it will soon enhance the value of farming lands along the river. The next thing will be the building of a little steamer to run up to the forks of the river, and that will be done inside of another year.

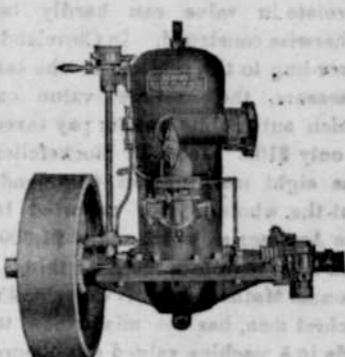
