Frank Barrows Accidentally Shot and Killed.

The sad news reached here Friday of the accidental shooting of Frank Barrows of Bandon which had occurred the previous afternoon while he and Wm. Button were out hunting in the mountains below Dairyville. At the time of the accident they had killed a deer and Mr. Button was carrying it while Mr. Barrows was carrying their two guns and in some way while walking on a log the latter slipped and fell with the guns, one of which was discharged, the ball entering his left side, causing death in almost an hour. The parties were well back in the hills and it required from Thursday evening till Saturday morning to get the body to Bandon, as many as 20 men working to prepare a trail and helping to carry the body out.

The deceased was well known throughout the entire Coquille valley, he having followed steamboating on the river for the past 24 years, and his friends were numbered as his acquaintances.

He leaves a wife and eight children to mourn his sad untimely taking away, who will greatly miss the guidance and support of a loving husband and father, besides his mother, a sister, Mrs. L. C. Gibson, and three brothers, Sam, Bia and Lee Barrows.

The sorrowing widow and children have the heart-felt sympathy of the entire community.
