Circuit Court in Session.

After the preliminaries of the adjourned term of Friday and Saturday were completed, and many motions passed upon, and, as usual a great many cases continued for the term, on Monday morning the regular term began in earnest, with Judge J. W. Hamilton on the bench and District Attorney Brown in charge of the grand jury. The first case demanding the assembling of a trial jury was that of John Kelly for the stabbing of Wm. Wearn, at Libby, who is being defended by Jno. D. Goss. Following are the jurors trying the case: B. F. Griffin, H. E. Wilcox, L. C. Gibson, W. G. Lawhorn, H. C. Noble, Geo. W. Cox, G. C. Hago, M. D. Cutlip, F. A. Mehl, L. A. Lawhorn, L. D. Belieu, J. C. Merchant. Jury dis-agrees—stood 3 for conviction and 9 for acquittal. Richard McKinstry was sentenced to one year for assault and battery upon his wife.

The first meeting of the Coquille Educational League will be held at the schoolhouse, Friday, Sept. 14th, at 3:30 p. m. All parents and friends of the public school are invited to be present. The program for the afternoon will consist of literary and musical selections, a 20-minute address by Mr. Orvil Dodge and reorganization of the League, preparatory for the ensuing year. NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received for the construction of a bridge or plank way across Carlson Creek and Marsh in Road Dist. No. 1, according to plans and specifications as follows: Width of bridge 10 feet, with a turn-out at middle 16 feet wide and of sufficient length for teams to pass, length of bridge about 610 feet. Posts at least 6 inches square shall be set 4 feet in the ground and shall extend above ground on the bank of the creek 4 1/2 feet and continue to foot hill on even grade; 3 posts to the bent and bents 10 feet apart, except across creek, at which point a span shall cross creek, caps of 3x8 inch cedar shall be drift-bolted to posts, and three stringers 3x10 inch toenailed into caps. Posts, caps and stringers to be of red cedar. Decking shall be of 2x12 inch fir spiked thoroughly into the stringers with at least 6 spikes to the plank, spikes to be 6 inches long.
