Rev. Ford's Farewell.

Rev. H. L. Ford who has for the past year been in charge of the work of the Christian church at this place and at Myrtle Point, preached his farewell sermon to an exceedingly large audience in this place on Sunday evening, the 20th.

The sermon was one dealing with the duties of a preacher and his responsibility, and was handled in a masterly manner, considering that it came on an evening after the conducting of two funerals, they being that of Mrs. R. E. Buck and the infant of Mrs. Millan, the former at 11 a. m. and the latter at 3:30 p. m. Mr. and Mrs. Ford like this section very much, and would not leave at this time only for the fact that Mrs. Ford's mother is in delicate health and they wish to live nearer and where they can reach her more handily than from this point. Mr. Ford has accepted a call by the church at Hood river, and they will move to that point for the present. It is with sincere regrets that these people go from among us. They have made no enemies, and their friends are numbered by the acquaintances they have formed throughout the county, both inside and out of the church. Mr. Ford is a pleasant and forceful speaker and takes no part in outside issues but preaches the gospel straight from a truly Christian standpoint of view, while Mrs. Ford is a singer of more than ordinary ability, and has been a great help to her husband.

There is a report current that a Rev. J. E. Stebbens, of Arkansas, will take the place of Mr. Ford, dividing his time between Coquille and Myrtle Point. He also has a wife who is a great helper in his services, being a thorough musician and a fine singer.

A bride of Sunday is widow before Monday closed is the sad experience of Vega Anderson-Rogers, whose wedding announcement appears in this paper. Mr. Rogers who was a resident of Bandon came up Saturday according to their plans, and on Sunday were married by Rev. Gordon, of the M. E. Church in this city and returned to Bandon that day with his bride. On the way up he complained of a severe headache which did not abate and on Monday at 10 a. m. he suffered a stroke of paralysis or apoplexy from which he did gain consciousness and passed away Monday evening.

Coquille has a school of which a town much above her size might well feel proud. Others have voted to carry a grade or so higher than ours, but their attendance in those grades is so light that they are not worth considering, while Coquille has a very large attendance in her high school rooms. With the close of last week there were thirty-four good and earnest workers in these grades, and two more are to enter this week. In order to give the teachers of the upper grades more time, the teachers of the three lower after the little ones are dismissed remain and hear recitations from the higher rooms.

After the wedding of Taylor G. Bunch and Miss Georgiana Leep in this place last week, the family of Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Leep, of Bancroft, became somewhat scattered. The bride accompanied the groom to Southern California where they will spend the winter, while Miss Vergie went to Salem to enter a hospital to train for a nurse, and Harold went to Gravel Ford to enter the Academy at that place, leaving Mr. and Mrs. Leep to return home alone.

Capt. Tom White's little son, Thos., jr., had the misfortune to get a serious fall from a high walk into a basement which was being excavated for a new building near their home in Bandon, with the result that his skull was fractured beside other more or less serious hurts. It was at first thought that there was no possible show for his recovery, but at last accounts, we understand, that there is a ray of hope.

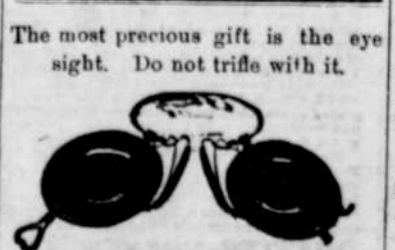
