### Stopped by Atlantic.

St. Louis Oct. 23.—At 1 o'clock this afternoon with only a balloon, Isle de France, to be heard from, the German contestant, Pommern, which landed at Asbury Park, N. J., at 9 a. m., after covering 880 miles, has a lead of 90 miles over its nearest competitor, the German balloon Dusseldorf, which landed at Dover, Del., after a flight of 790 miles, airline, from St. Louis.

A balloon, the Isle de France, carrying a French flag, which passed over Mount Holly, 270 miles northeast of Philadelphia today, has been reported near Hightstown, N. J., moving in the direction of Long Branch, N. J., not far from Asbury Park.

As this time it seems practically certain that the German balloon Pommern, which landed on the shores of the Atlantic at Asbury Park, N. J., has won the Lahm trophy and cash prize of \$2500. Records for flight distance and for duration are being broken by nearly every balloon in the race. The record for the race as sailed from Paris last year was 402 miles. The German balloon Pommern No. 1, with Oscar Erbsloch as pilot landed today at Asbury Park, N. J., after covering an airline distance from St. Louis of nearly 880 miles. The world's record for flight, not made in a contest, however, is 1200 miles, held by Count Henry de La Vaux of France. Count de La Vaux also held the duration record of 41 hours and five minutes, which is being exceeded by every cup contestant landing today.

The Pommern, up to noon, apparently held the lead in the race. Another German contestant, Dusseldorf, is apparently second, having landed near Dover, Del., which is a distance approximately 825 miles to her credit.

The American balloon St. Louis landed at Westminster Md., not far from Baltimore, after a flight of 730 miles.

The United States landed last night at Coaledo, Ont., after a flight of 650 miles. The third American contestant, the America, with Mc Coy in the basket, landed at 8 o'clock this morning at Patuxent about two miles and a half from Annapolis Junction.

The English contestant, Lotus 11, has landed in Ohio, 475 miles away, having descended because of the illness of Lieutenant Brabason, the aids to Pilot Brewer.

A message received at the Aero Club headquarters states that the German balloon Abercon landed at Manassas, Prince William County, Va., at 7:10 a. m. today.

A message from Mineral, Va., says a balloon passed near that city at 7:35 this morning. It was about 150 yards high and headed northeast. The balloon landed two miles from Arminus mines and turned out to be French. It had covered in its course about 1200 miles.

The contest for first honors is sure to be close, and the official record made by the balloons will not be known until measurements are received from Government sources at Washington.

### Select Small Trees

It will soon be time to select the nursery stock for those who wish to set out an orchard this fall, and the words of James Meehan, the popular horticulturist of Philadelphia should be heeded:

"One of the mistakes of the day is the universal desire of those purchasing trees to buy something large. There is an excuse for a person of some age desiring to start with a large tree, but none for those who are young. And indeed, whether young or old, there is wisdom in choosing a young tree. So many, many times have I seen the small tree outstrip the large one that in but very few cases would I prefer a large tree to a small one. Considering fruit trees, a two or three year old apple tree is of the right kind, and with peaches one from the bud. It hardly needs saying that the primary reason why a young tree is better than others is because in removal most all the roots can be handled and reset makes the transplanting hardly felt by the tree. A large tree feels it much more; some roots are lost; perhaps the replanting is not as easily accomplished, causing a check to growth which takes a long time to recover from. It takes a little philosophy, I am aware, to reject a fine, large tree for a small one, because it looks like poor practice, but it pays to do it. As a rule, city merchants who have small orchards attached to their grounds will not plant small trees.

An acquaintance, owner of a large orchard near a city, says that of all fruits, the very largest trees procurable sell the best. He makes no attempt to offer trees under five or six years old, as he could not sell them. For all this, set out young trees, feed them and cultivate them, and you will have done the best thing for the best growth."

I wish to see the levees so strongly built as to remove completely from the minds of dwellers of those lower regions all apprehension of a possible overflow. I advocate no impossible task. No difficult task. The people of Holland, a little nation, took two-thirds of their country out from under the sea, and they live behind the dykes now and have for centuries in safety.
