School Notes

The second school month ended Nov. 1st, with an average daily attendance of 280.5, making the per cent of attendance almost 96. The high school Department leads with a per cent of attendance of 98.8, Miss Thora Smith's Department being second with 97.7 and Miss Kathryn Wells' third with 97. Some of the rooms are so badly crowded that, if many more pupils come into the district, it will be necessary to secure more room. There were only four records of tardiness during the entire month, but even that number can and should be reduced. The whole number of days of absence was 243, which was entirely too many; parents, pupils, and teachers should co-operate to make a better showing in this particular, during the ensuing month.

Plans are nearly perfected for the organization of an athletic club to include both boys and girls, the under separate divisions. Principal E. E. Daring is trying to arrange for friendly rivalry in athletic sports and in literary contests, among the leading schools of Coos County.

Oregon Society Sons of American Revolution

The Oregon Society of the sons of the American Revolution offers prizes to the pupils of the public schools of the State of Oregon, for essays on subjects connected with our War for Independence.

Prize of \$20.00, \$15.00 \$10.00 and \$5.00 will be awarded for the first, second, third and fourth best essays written on any of the following subjects:

1. Washington the Great Leader.
2. The flag of the United States.
3. The Boston Tea Party.
4. The Treason of Benedict Arnold.

The essays are limited to three thousand words each, must be written in the student's own handwriting on one side only of the paper, and accompanied by a certificate of the writer's teacher, stating that it is a pupil in a designated class, and that the teacher believes the essay to be the pupil's own unaided work. The essays must be signed by the writer, giving also his or her postoffice address. They should be forwarded to Mr. R. I. Eckerson, Chairman of Committee, Room 5, Washington Building, Portland, Oregon, and should reach their destination not later than March 31, 1908.

In awarding these prizes the committee will be governed by considerations of:

1. Originality.
2. Accuracy of Statement.
3. Manner of Treatment.
4. Orthography, Syntax and Punctuation.

These prizes are offered to encourage love of our country and the study of its history.

An Old-Fashioned Remedy.

Briek wielder of the birch and rule. The teacher of the village school. No doubt there are teachers who would cheerfully engage to apply the ruler, according to these instructions and with a firm faith in its efficacy as a corrective and alterative remedy.
