Seattle, Wash., Nov. 22.—Fighting desperately for her life and for the lives of four small children, whom her drunken husband was attempting to kill, Mrs. Ed Brace, 1309 East Twenty-fifth street, Tacoma, prevented the murder being committed last night by throwing a lighted lamp at her husband, setting fire to the man's clothing.

Brace, armed with an ax, attacked his wife in a drunken fury and swore he would kill her and the children. With his clothes spattered with burning oil and standing in the center of a pool of flames, caused by the breaking of the lamp, Brace presented a hideous spectacle. Waving his ax over his head, he advanced again on this wife and with a child under each arm the terrified woman sought flight. As she reached the head of the stairs Brace made a terrific sweep with the ax, planning to strike the woman squarely in the head. She, however, stumbled and fell headlong downstairs. Both mother and children were scratched and bruised, but Mrs. Brace says the timely fall saved her.

By Monday J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the Harriman system in Oregon, will have all the cars necessary to move the great wheat crop from the Inland Empire to tidewater. The railroad is now exerting every energy to assemble all the cars possible and in a few days there will be fully 1000 cars in the service and they will be used exclusively in the grain trade until the fast of the crop has been shifted from the warehouses in the wheat belt to the harbor at Portland.

This is the assurance which the exporters of Portland have been wanting for the past two weeks. They have been complaining at the lack of cars available to move the crop, declaring that they have not one-fourth the number necessary. This condition will shortly be relieved and the long-desired and much-hoped-for movement will be in full swing in less than three days.—Telegram.

Newport, R. I., Nov. 22.—Mrs. Ida Lewis, keeper of the Lime Rock lighthouse at the southern end of Newport Harbor, has been again honored for bravery in saving lives in her term at that point. Andrew Carnegie has put her on his private pension list, insuring \$30 a month during her lifetime.

In the name of the state of Oregon: You are hereby notified that you are required to appear in answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: within six weeks from the 23rd day of October, 1907, the same being the date of the first publication of this summons.
