Not only Texas but a dozen other Southern and Western States have land that is worth looking after, and if it is exploited in the proper manner it will yield safer dividends than can be taken out of that maelstrom of speculation in the "little old New York."—Oregonian.

Cost of Hauling Farm Products.

Frank Andrews of the United States Agricultural Department, writes: "In hauling products from farms in wagons there are opportunities for a saving in cost. In many regions in the United States the improvement of a road, or a short, rough section of a road, would allow much larger loads to be hauled than at present. If it were possible to increase the average weight of a wagon load of cotton in the United States from three bales, as it now is, to four bales, without increasing the cost of hauling the load, the saving on the crop equal to the one picked in 1905 would amount to \$2,000,000; and if the average load of wheat, now fifty-five bushels, were increased by twenty bushels, the saving increase in hauling a crop like that of 1904 would be more than \$8,000,000."

The Woman's Study Club.

The work of the club at the last meeting was thoroughly enjoyed by all present, many of Robert Browning's poems being read and discussed, after an estimate of his literary productions given. All members responded to roll call with quotations from the author's poems.
