## A Much Needed Enterprise.

Doctors Culin and Richmond have by their enterprise in fitting out so excellent a hospital as the Western Oregon General Hospital in this city, performed a great public service.

A hospital should be viewed as a public institution, run for the general good. In many countries the hospitals are run by the government. In England hospitals are generally entirely or almost entirely supported by volunteers' contributions and the patients are treated free, and even in this country, there are in some counties free hospitals maintained from a fund raised by a tax levied much the same as the Poll tax.

Hospital treatment is one of those unexpected necessities that any members of a community may need at any hour. There are at this moment many people in hospitals laid low by some disease or accident—people who but a few weeks ago were in the full flush of health. No doubt many of those people had made no provision for such a contingency, and the inevitable expense in too many cases will eat up the hard earned savings or cause a heavy debt to be incurred that must be met, unless friends or relatives bear the expense.

Drs. Culin and Richmond are offering a most generous proposition to the people of Coquille and vicinity whereby any sickness from the toothache to appendicitis can be treated without any fee or expense for medicine or operations, nursing or medical attendance.

This proposition is well known in keeping with the characters of the Doctors. The details of the plan by which they hope to get all the people in Coquille and vicinity to contribute their mite toward the maintenance of the hospital is contained in a pamphlet just published.

The Doctors have placed the management of this plan in the hands of Mr. P. Howell Poole, an energetic gentleman who has recently come to reside among us. Mr. Poole tells us that he will be pleased to explain the details of this plan to any one who cares to mail him a card to the general delivery at Coquille mentioning name and address of inquirer.

## Burned at Sea

The large gasoline schooner, Satoyome, which we reported in our last issue as having sailed from Bandon, when off the Northern California coast took fire and vessel and cargo were destroyed. The crew fought the flames bravely but were unable to control them. The steamer Nelson which appeared on the scene did all she could but was unable to quench the flames. She stood by and kept her pumps going till she also took fire and was obliged to withdraw and look after troubles of her own. The crew was all saved. An attempt was made to tow her into Eureka, but the lines burned off as fast as they could get them on, making all efforts to do anything for her entirely futile. She carried a large cargo, principally telephone poles.

Washington, Dec. 11.—President Roosevelt will not be a candidate for a third term. All doubt on this point was tonight dispelled by the authoritative statement, from the White House, that Mr. Roosevelt still adheres to the declaration of renunciation made on the election three years ago. In the statement issued tonight, the President says he has not changed and will not change the decision delivered to the American people in 1904. It appears that the President had been awaiting the call for the Republican National Convention to afford the proper opportunity for making his position clear and unmistakable, thus leaving the field clear for other declared or receptive candidates for the Republican nomination.

Articles of incorporation have recently been filed by Fred B. Haight & Co., at Salem under the laws of California, and the office and principal place of business to be at Coquille, Oregon. Geo. E. Peoples is to be the Attorney in fact and general manager of the corporation at this place. This corporation operates the O. K. Creamery in this place.

## Markets, Consolidate.

There has been a change in the meat market business in this city. E. S. Dean, of the City Market, W. V. Cope and B. L. Holenbeck have bought out the Enterprize Meat company and will close the shop recently conducted by Mr. Dean, and the business of the new firm will be conducted at the stand and still under the name of the Enterprize Meat Co., but will be styled the People's Market. These gentlemen are all known in the country and need no introduction or recommendation at our hand. Mr. Dean has conducted a market at Myrtle Point and this place for several years and has quite a reputation as an extra fine hand at preparing breakfast bacon, while he has had a valuable helper in the person of Mr. Holenbeck for some time, while Mr. Cope has been our hustling street commissioner for a while.

Tacoma Washington, Dec. 12.—Another cargo of wheat valued at more than \$200,000 left port yesterday afternoon for Europe. The British steamer Craighall, under charter to Kerr, Gifford & Company, cleared yesterday morning at custom house with 224,859 bushels valued at \$204,625. Since the first of the week 639,151 bushels of wheat have been shipped from Tacoma, valued at \$639,207, and other cargoes will be dispatched before the week's end. The total for the entire week is almost sure to be a record-breaker in wheat exports.
