### Coquille Valley Real Estate Association.

We have long seen the need of such an association and believe that through such an organization the valley can be more fully advertised.

Powder & Co.), Frank Burkholder (manager of the Pacific Real Estate Co.), C. R. Barrow and Z. C. Strang (of the Home Realty Co.), B. Folsom, W. L. Kistner and B. B. Paull.

The following officers were elected: Geo. E. Peoples, Chairman; R. R. Powder, Secretary; J. J. Stanley, Treasurer.

Chas. Stanley, R. R. Powder, and Frank Burkholder were appointed a committee on literature with which to advertise this section of the county and if anyone has any ideas they consider good, give them to any one of the above committee.

We hereby extend our aid to this new association.

The Oregon Agricultural College will give winter short courses, beginning January 7, 1908, as follows:

1. General Agriculture, two weeks
2. Dairying " "
3. Horticulture " "
4. Mechanic Arts " "
5. Household Science " "

Many young men as well as many mature farmers who are so situated that they cannot take a four years' course of study desire to acquaint themselves more fully with the most recent developments in agriculture. There are others who feel the need of a more practical knowledge of farm mechanics and the use of tools. It is to meet the needs of these classes that these courses will be given. The course in household science will be of value to the women of the home who desire to more thoroughly acquaint themselves with the principles of good cooking and of general home management. The subjects to be discussed will be of interest and importance to every farmer and homemaker and it is hoped that a large number will take advantage of this opportunity.

A circular containing further information will be sent on application to the agricultural college, Corvallis, Oregon.

On our first page we give an article from the American Farmer which treats upon the proper packing of fruit, apples in particular, for the markets. Its truthfulness was emphasized by the statement of a friend who had just arrived from Portland, in which she informed us that apples were selling from \$3.50 to \$7.00 per box in that city. This does not signify that no apples grow in Oregon, but that our people are not up to the requirements of the new laws and regulations governing the marketing of the fruit. From this it will behoove every person with an orchard to clean up and cultivate his trees and make them grow marketable apples or crop them down.

A Meeting of the fruit growers of Coos county has been called to be held Friday, Jan. 3, 2 p. m. in the Marshfield, Chamber of commerce rooms, for the purpose of deciding upon a suitable man for county fruit inspector and to effect a fruit growers' association.

### Many Miners Killed.

Jacobs Creek, Pa., Dec. 19.—An explosion of gas in the Darr mine of the Pittsburgh Coal Company, located here, today entombed between 200 and 250 miners, and there is scarcely a ray of hope that a single one of them will be taken from the mine alive. Partially wrecked buildings in the vicinity of the mine and the condition of the few bodies found early in the rescue work indicate an explosion of such terrific force that it seems impossible that any one could have survived it. All of the 13 bodies taken out up to this time are terribly mutilated, and three of them are headless.

This is the third mine disaster since the first of the month in the veins of bituminous coal underlying Western Pennsylvania and West Virginia, for the Naomi mine near Fayette City and the two mines at Monongah, W. Va., in which the earlier explosions happened, are in the same belt as the local workings. Today's catastrophe swells the number of victims of deadly mine gas for the 19 days to between 550 and 600.
