Dr. J. W. Strange, pioneer dentist and newspaperman, prominent ut one time a leading factor in local Republican politics, died at his home, in this city, early Sunday morning, Feb, 9, 1908, after a lingering illness of dropsy. He was been confined to his house constantly for the past three weeks, during which time he experienced alternating periods of improvement his death he was reported to be feeling considerably better, but when his bedside was visited at 4 o'clock the following Morning, the dim light of life had gone out.

Born in Blount county, Tennessee, Nov. 21, 1852, Dr. Strange came to Oregon with his parents. now deceased, and settled near Wilbur, this county. He taught school and studied dentistry, and was admitted to practice the latter profession when 28 years of age. Although a highly competent dentist, he devoted a great part of his life to conducting news papers, always on Republican principles, and this brought him into prominence in his party. He was elected school suserving one term, after which he served successively as reading clerk of the lower house of the Oregon legislature and chief clerk of the

During his tenure of office as school suprintendent, Dr. Strenge acted as editor of the old Roseburg Plaindealer. Later he conducted newspapers in eastern Oregon and Washington, chief among the Pendleton (Or.) Tribune. During the taking of the government census in 1890 he acted as superintendent of that work in eastern Oregon. At the conclusion of these duties in 1891, Dr. Strange reumed the practice of dentistry in Eastern Oregon and Washington and later in Douglass and Coos counties. In 1903 he moved back to Rosebrg, and two years lrter embarked upon bis last newspaper venture by establishing the Roseburg Spokesman He continued actively at work until January 1, of this year, when he beame so severely afflicted with the malady that resulted in his death.

Dr. Strange was a charter member and the first Master Workman of Roseburg Lodge No. 16, A. O. U. W., a Past Grand of Philetarian Lodge, I. O. O. F. and Past Consul Commauder of Oak Camp No. charter member of the Roseburg Presbyterian church, and a member of Union Encampment I. O. O. F.
